This little Belgian woman has come to Toronto from New York to do her "bit" for the Canadian Victory Loan, by telling some of the things which she knows at first hand of the early days of the German invasion of Belgium.

It was intensely thrilling at the King Edward Hotel last night to listen to the story as told to some women of the press by this interesting Belgian refugee, who from her house on the

The hypocrisy of Kaiser.

The hypocrisy of the kaiser was brought out by Miss Schiltz when she quoted the note written after the sack of Louvain, when he said: "My hand by the Germany," said Miss Schiltz, the pride of these first brave days beaming in her eyes, "but by and by the Germans were so great we had to fall back."

"After the sack of Louvain they came on, bringing with them the great gun, called the Big Bertha, drawn by sixty horses, I saw the refugees coming in, and talked with them. All had suffered."

How the Germans treated the people of the vicinity of Schaerbeeck, the suburb in which Miss Schiltz lived, was illustrated when she said. "For instance our milkman. He had disappeared for some days. When he came back he told us the Germans started to shoot. They made the street while they went into the houses and took all they wanted of the furniture, the antiques, then they smashed the rest. They made the men go into the church, and kept them there for three days. The women were left in the houses with the doors and windows open to the Germans."

Sample of Kultur.

"A woman came to the window to put out a bit of a white sheet, and a German must have got behind her somehow and stabbed her in the back. This was German kultur," said the Belgian refugee with fine sarcasm.

A Canadian soldier whom Miss Schiltz saw in New York showing a pair of field glasses that he had taken from a German officer, was the inspiration of her work in a similar line. She told a woman who was working on the Liberty Loan that she had a proclamation, and the worker invited her to show it. By and by she was induced to tell something of her experiences. The Directors have satisfaction in presenting to the Stockholders the Seventieth Annual Statement of the Company and to report a large increase in the number of customers and in the output of gas.

During the year, 1,535 new service connections have been made, and as there have been practically no additions to the street mains system, these services represent new business on existing main pipe lines. The general shortage of coal and the difficulties experienced by citizens in obtaining sufficient Coal for the heating of their houses, has resulted in large quantities of gas being used for this purpose.

The consumption of gas in munition plants, military establishments and for general industrial purposes has continued to increase.

The Company's manufacturing plant has, therefore, been taxed to nearly the limit of its capacity; but it is gratifying to your Directors that there has been no failure on the part of the Company in meeting these

Economic conditions have, of course, practically prohibited the installation of new manufacturing plant.

It will not be a matter of surprise to the Shareholders that there have been increases in the cost of raw materials used in the manufacture of gas, but the Directors have thought it well to show the actual increases to the Company in certain items of operating costs for the past year as compared with the cost of the same items in 1915

GAS OIL. Increase per gallon 4.1c.
LABOR. Average Increase per hour 13c.
TAXES. Increase Having these figures in mind it is not surprising that the financial statement shows an adverse balance, after payment of interest charges and dividend. Your Directors, however, are of the opinion that they are justified in allowing the Company to carry a fair share of the burden of the war, and they have, therefore, refrained from increasing the price of gas to a point which would yield sufficient revenue to cover all of the increase in the cost of gas.
