## A STORM AT SAGINAW.

Many Buildings Were Unroofed and Electric Light Towers Blown Down—Loss \$100,000.

Saginaw, Mich., Aug. 10.—A terribly destructive wind and electrical storm swept over this city about 2 o'clock this morning. The spire of the Jefferson Church, 100 feet high, was struck by lightning and leveled to the ground and a portion of the edifice was unroofed. The works of the Hart Machine and Illuminating Company were unroofed and the power-house was destroyed. The Electric Light Company suffered in like manner.

Boiler Shop, Mels. Smart & Co.'s warehouse, Palmerston's Woodmenware Works, the Saginaw Basket Factory and Bliss & Van Augusten's Mill were unroofed or otherwise damaged. Hundreds of chimneys were blown down and thousands of trees uprooted and lumber piles scattered.

The Hotel was struck by lightning and slightly damaged, and John Peterson's residence was destroyed. Nine electric light towers were blown down. No casualties have been reported. The damage will reach \$100,000.

## SEVEN BUILDINGS GONE.

In the Thunderstorm Which Swept Over the Western End of the Province on Sunday Night.

Chatham, Ont., Aug. 10.—The thunder, lightning and rain storms of the past 48 hours have been the most severe as well as disastrous ever known in this section. During Saturday night and last night, for hours at a time, the sky was one continual sheet of flame.

So far reports of the burning of several buildings have reached this city. These were from Norton, two large barns and three houses, covered by insurance.

## WORKING ON THE ESTIMATES.

The Figures to Be Laid Before the Minister This Week.

There will be but little change.

What Robert Watson, Manitoba Minister of Works, Says.

His Trip to Ottawa Has Nothing to Do With the Vacant Portfolio of Interior.

The Manitoba Crop to Be One-Third Less Than That of Last Year—Despite Regarding the Reformatory at Alexandria—Minister Borden Appoints His Cousin as His Secretary.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—(Special.)—Hon. J. Israel Tarte, Minister of Public Works, was at Alexandria on Saturday on a visit of inspection to the reformatory there.

It appears that a difference of opinion arose between Mr. Joseph Bourque, the contractor, and Mr. Fuller, chief architect of public works, regarding the foundation of the reformatory, which is now being laid, and the contractor asked for an outside authority to be called in. This was accordingly done, and Mr. Percival of Montreal was asked by the Department of Public Works to examine into the dispute and decide between the parties. He accordingly visited Alexandria on Saturday, and in company with Mr. Tarte and the Government architect, went over the work. The report will be prepared at once and forwarded to the department here.

The report is current in town that Bourque, who has made little progress with his contract so far, finds that at the figure at which he took it he is going to lose money unless he can work in on extras. His price was \$35,000, while the departmental estimate was \$40,000.

Getting the Estimates Ready.

The estimates to be laid before Parliament will be prepared by the Minister of the departments of the Ministry of the Interior.
