It was a statement of that nature which was handed to Sir William this morning in his private car, at Windsor-street Station. The President had just arrived back from the west, the Saskatchewan being attached to the Chicago train which arrived this-morning.

"I don't know anything about the rate war, and my trip to the west was on entire different business," was the reply which Sir William gave. Smokehouses are running night and day, which is unusual for this season. Cheese is ½c lower. The attempt to make an arrangement among the canners to control the market is meeting with difficulties, as some of the smaller concerns are relactant to curtail their output. The indications are that the 1898 pack will be an average one.



New York Money Markets.

The season is now approaching when Europe becomes a heavy purchaser of American staple products, and when the trade balance runs normally in favor of the United States. But it is also a season when the moving of crops necessitates a heavy outflow of currency from the east to the west. In ordinary years the net result of these two events is a hardening of money rates at New York, a decline in exchange and drafts upon foreign credit to so offset the losses of the local banks to the interior. How far the usual experience will be modified by the deviopments of the past year might be made the subject of lengthy discussion and calculation. It will, however, suffice to suggest two important features of difference from last year's situation, which will unquestionably have the effect of minimizing the need of gold importations—the abundance of money in the west and the far stronger position of the New York banks. The reality of the first feature has nowhere been more convincingly demonstrated than in the urgent demand for the new Government bonds, which came from the agricultural regions. As for the local banks, their increased strength is fully shown by the fact that while loans are over \$100,000,000 greater than this times a year ago, cash reserves are \$40,000,000 higher.

The weekly New York bank statement says: Surplus reserve decreased \$6,353,825, loans decreased \$4,907,600, specie decreased \$0,124,900, legal tenders decreased \$E343,300, deposits decreased \$16,457,500, circulation decreased \$105,400. The banks now hold \$43,011,000 in excess of legal requirements.
