Port Arthur, Ont., Oct. 21.—(Special.)—The steamer Chisholm arrived last evening from Duluth with six of the crew of the Chisholm, owned by Bradley of Cleveland, who were picked up from a yawl boat by the Dixon this evening. The steamer Chisholm left Duluth on Sunday evening, having the schooner John Martin in tow. The steamer had a cargo of 92,000 bushels of barley, the schooner 1,200,000 feet of lumber.

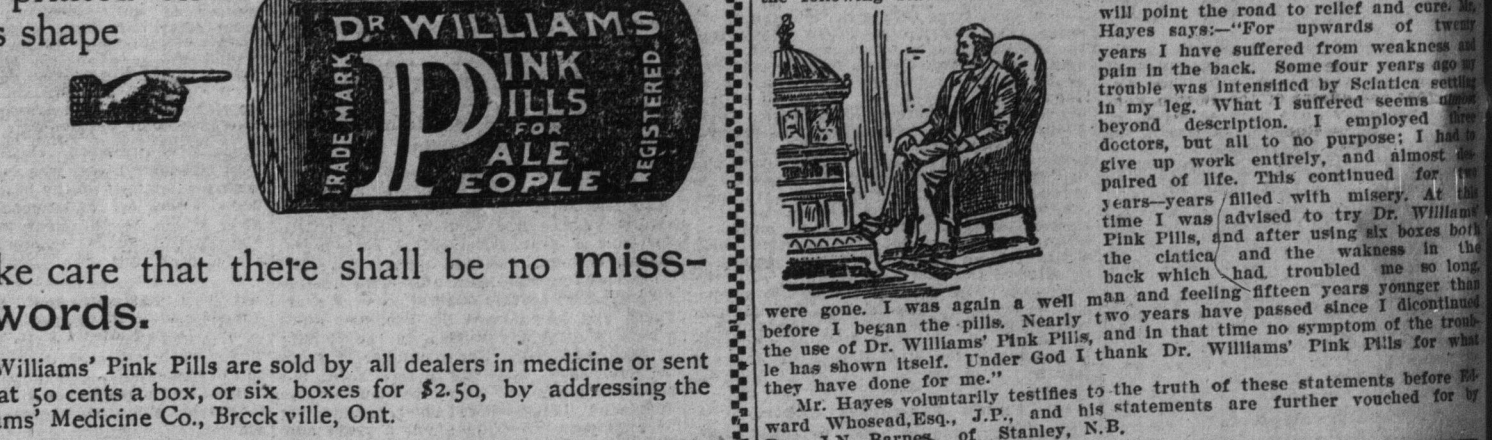

Bank of England Notes Forged.
Believed That Anarchists Have Put Many Into Circulation.
London, Oct. 21.—A despatch from Vienna to the Central News says it was found that the man Regier, who was arrested at Tropa, Austria, on Saturday, was in the charge of attempting to pass forged Bank of England notes, addressed to a man known as Joki, in Buda Pest, who has since been arrested. Joki's real name was Schwalbe. Forged bank notes were found in his possession, together with a number of letters and other apparatus for forging notes, a letter and an Anarchist paper. It is believed that these spurious notes have been widely circulated through Anarchists. A young woman with whom Schwalbe lived has been arrested as an accomplice.

She Died Naturally.

She had complained of being ill during the night, and Mr. Yevers had attended to her until 5 o'clock, when he fell asleep. When he awoke, two hours later, he found his wife dead. In the meantime Dr. Silverthorn made a post-mortem examination, and notified the coroner that death was due to natural causes. The warrant was then withdrawn.
