

Local Opinion Advocates Again Fruitless Appeal for Submission of Bylaw.

COUNCILLORS RILED BY THREATS.

Shipment of Dead Meat to Germany Demands Corporate Inspection First—Bylawmakers Retire.

Toronto Junction, April 8.—Most citizens were of the opinion that the local option bylaw question had been definitely settled by the Town Council on Monday, and it was a surprise to those who turned up at the adjourned meeting of the council to find that there was present a large delegation of temperance advocates sitting on the side benches. The outlook was naturally enquired what the meaning of it was, and a rumor to the effect that it had been discovered that there were not the number of names on the petition against submitting a bylaw that it was stated there, and that one of the councillors who voted on Monday night against submitting the bylaw was likely to change his vote, led to much speculation of what was going to happen. The absence of Councillors Hynd and Beatty also caused comment, and the councillors naturally inquired the reason therefor. The councillors Baird and Howell started the discussion by moving a resolution to submit a local option bylaw. The Mayor, sitting on the side benches, had previously voted against the motion. DEATH DEALING TORNADO

Alabama Settlement Suffers From Windstorm and 11 Persons Killed.

Hanceville, Ala., April 8.—A tornado passed over Hanceville, on Monday, and a half mile north of here, at 2 o'clock this morning. Eleven were killed, seven of whom were children, four children were fatally hurt and three persons seriously injured. The tornado was slightly injured. Of the dead and injured, seven are from one family and eight from another. One man's body was blown over 200 yards. Other houses were blown down and trees were uprooted in all directions. The storm was heard at Hanceville, but no damage was done here. Deputies hurried to the scene and carried the bodies to the hospital. It is possible the death list may be increased later.

Little Rock, Ark., April 8.—A cyclone, three miles wide, passed through Auburn and White Counties, north of here, on Monday night, and it is reported that it is feared the total loss of life will be large. The cyclone is reported to have been seen at Little Rock, and details are hard to obtain.

AMONG THE UNIONS

The men who quit work at Firstbrook are considering the advisability of returning to the employment. The men are evincing a willingness to discuss the wage. The cabinet makers initiated a number of new members last night. A new wage scale will be presented to the employers in a few days.

Referendum Prisoner Released

The case of Robert Forster of St. Thomas, who was convicted of corrupt practices at the referendum vote, which came up on the return of a writ of habeas corpus before Mr. Justice Bell on Tuesday, was decided yesterday. The release of the prisoner was ordered. Forster was in the States when convicted, and on his return, he was confined in a jail. Judge Bell, after a writ of certiorari, ordering a stay of all proceedings, pending the settlement of the writ of jurisdiction, had been issued by the High Court.

Another Volcano Active

New York, April 8.—An eruption of the old volcano, Del Peño, in the Columbia, is reported. It occurred on March 22. The village of Tijeo was destroyed, and from 80 to 100 persons killed or hurt. During the eruption, March 24 the flames from the volcano were seen passing vessels at a distance of 60 miles.

Welland Canal Open Monday

Port Huron, April 8.—In reply to an inquiry this evening the deputy superintendent says the Welland Canal will be ready for opening on Monday next as already announced from Ottawa.

QUEER CHARGE OF FRAUD. Toronto Men Accused of Connection With Margolius Fraud Case.

Montreal, April 8.—Warrants have been issued for the arrest of three residents of Toronto, who are suspected of having been connected with the George Margolius frauds. Margolius is charged with having defrauded a number of Quebec and Ontario business houses.

The warrants in question are for Maurice Backrach, Horace Levy and William Blakeley. High Constable Bissonnette of Montreal was in the city on Saturday in connection with the affair.

Mr. Backrach went east last night. To The World he said: "I don't know any more about it than you do. I think someone is putting me in a bad job. I bought goods from him just the same as I would from anyone else as long as they are not stolen, and now someone is trying to implicate me. I don't know what they think I've been doing, but I suppose we shall have to answer to-morrow."

Mr. Backrach stated that Margolius had obtained goods on credit, and had then sold them and skipped out with the proceeds. He had dealt with him in the usual course of business, and knew no more than that the swindler had carried on business in Montreal and had decamped to Chicago.
