

Meteoric Career of Great Promoter Astonished Financial World in 1896. Kidney Pills

London, May 10.-Ernest Terah Hooley, whose meteoric career and com pany promoting a few years ago astonished the financial world, was arrested in London to-day, on the charge of conspiracy to defraud. Hooley's colossal bankruptcy and the proceedings arising therefrom were the sensation of 1898. Since then he has been connected with various promotions, some of which led to court proceedings. Henry J. Lawson, another company promoter, was also arrested to-day in connection with the Hooley charge. Hooley and Lawson were subsequent-

ly brought up at Bow-street police court. They were charged with defrauding A. J. Payne of \$50,000, by selling him shares of Siberian gold mines and other worthless concerns.

Bail for Hooley was fixed at \$40,000, which was immediately given.

Lawson's was fixed at \$30,000, but was not precured.
