WOMEN'S WORK WELL DONE

Eminently Prosperous Year Just Closed by the W. C. A.

Nearly \$9,000 Devoted to Charity and the Treasury Still Has \$6,000—The President, Mrs. Robert Reid, Suggests Improving Some of the Homes—Election of Officers.

The annual meeting of the Women's Christian Association was held yesterday afternoon at the "Y" rooms, Dundas street. The president, Mrs. Reid, was in the chair, and the attendance was large. The business was chiefly the receiving of reports and the election of officers.

The association has enjoyed a remarkably prosperous year. Public interest in their work for sweet charity's sake was never greater, and the reports of all the officers were of a most satisfactory nature. The treasurer's statement showed the society's fortunate position, financially. After expending nearly \$9,000 there remains a balance of over \$6,000 to start the new year with.

Hope was expressed by the president, in her interesting address, that the association would soon get the Refuge and Infants' Home better and more effectively established. Mrs. Reid also pointed out the desirability of enlarging the Home for Incurables and the Aged People's Home.

The secretary, Mrs. Pattullo, presented the 24th annual report of the association. It showed that there were 38 inmates cared for in the Aged People's Home during the year. Five had died, and five had left. Twenty-eight patients were in the Home for Incurables, of whom 6 died and 2 were discharged. The relief committee had assisted 129 families during the year. Many garments, quilts and blankets were distributed. The report concluded with a feeling reference to the great loss sustained in the demise of a valued friend and fellow-worker, Mrs. Peto. "We are sincerely sorry to miss her kindly presence here today," the report read, "and we shall long miss the cheerful aid she was always so ready to extend to any project for the good of the association."

Mrs. Hutchinson reported for the relief committee. Mrs. M. A. Moore reported for the devotional committee; Mrs. C. Campbell reported for the improvement of the Home for Incurables visiting committee; Mrs. E. A. McKellar, for the relief committee; Mrs. J. Kent, for the Refuge and Infants' Home.
