The one exception was Crucible Steel, which made an early gain of 1½ points. Texas Company yielded almost 1 point, and tobacco shares were firm to strong. WILSON BLOCKING PEACE IN FIUME, IS ITALY'S CLAIM

Premier Promises Press That All Details Will Be Given Out.

PLOT TO LIBERATE HOCKNOLL FOILED

Kazoo Sheriff Outwits Plan To Free Slayer and Friends.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Sept. 19.—Receiving a tip that a conspiracy was afoot to liberate the prisoners between the jail and the railway station, Sheriff Eaton and a force of deputies whisked George Sylvester Hocknoll and three other criers out of the city before even relatives had been notified Thursday.

Hocknoll is the confessed slayer of Mrs. Beatie Voith, of Detroit, whose mangled body was found along the Michigan Central Railway west of this city August 2. The other prisoners were Ralph Jabusch, Detroit automobile hand; Rosecoe Stitt, inventor and automobile thief, and John Fenner, convicted of a crime against his own daughter.

Hocknoll left with the words: "I am going to Marquette prison to reform and be a man, but I hope to live to see those who did me dirt, dead. Judge Weiner can send me to prison, but he isn't the whole state government, and he can't keep me there."

BRITISH CABINET CRISIS NOT AT HAND

London Daily News Says Election Will Not Be Called.

POLICEMEN WILL NOT RESORT TO COURTS TO SECURE REINSTATEMENT

General Strike May Be Called In Boston To Support Striking Police.

London, Sept. 19.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The planning of a general strike in support of the international Zionist commission to Patrick Geddes, professor of botany at St. Andrews University, Scotland, has been disclosed. Mr. Geddes, who is considered one of the greatest living authorities in civic and social survey, will work in co-operation with Dr. Weizmann, head of the British Zionist commission.

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NO CHANCE OF BECK LEADING U. F. O., SAY SECRETARY MORRIS

Official Declares Organization Wants Farmers Only As Its Leaders.

Toronto, Sept. 18.—"Absolutely no truth in it." This was the emphatic statement of J. J. Morrison, made to the Farmers' Sun, when asked in regard to a dispatch from London in which it was stated that the United Farmers of Ontario were taking steps to secure Adam Beck as leader of their organization.

"The U. F. O. is a farm organization and nothing else," Mr. Morrison continued. "It has developed its own leaders from among its own class, and its views in the future, as in the past, will be voiced by men of its own class, and these men will be chosen from the farm."

"There is no foundation whatever for the allegation that the United Farmers' Association of Ontario is planning to elect Adam Beck as its leader," Mr. Morrison said.

"The plan is suggested to bring in Mr. Beck as house leader and to pose Sir Adam, who cannot make extensive speeches, as a popular idol."

MUNICIPALITIES IN QUEBEC WILL UNITE

Committee Appointed For Drafting of Constitution.

Montreal, Sept. 19.—Following the informal gathering that took place yesterday at Freeman's Hotel, at which the Quebec municipalities were largely represented, a Quebec union of municipalities looks like an accomplished fact. Not only were the preliminary steps for the organization of the union adopted, but a committee was appointed for drafting a constitution, and a date was fixed for a convention of representatives of all the municipalities of the province for the adoption of the constitution.
