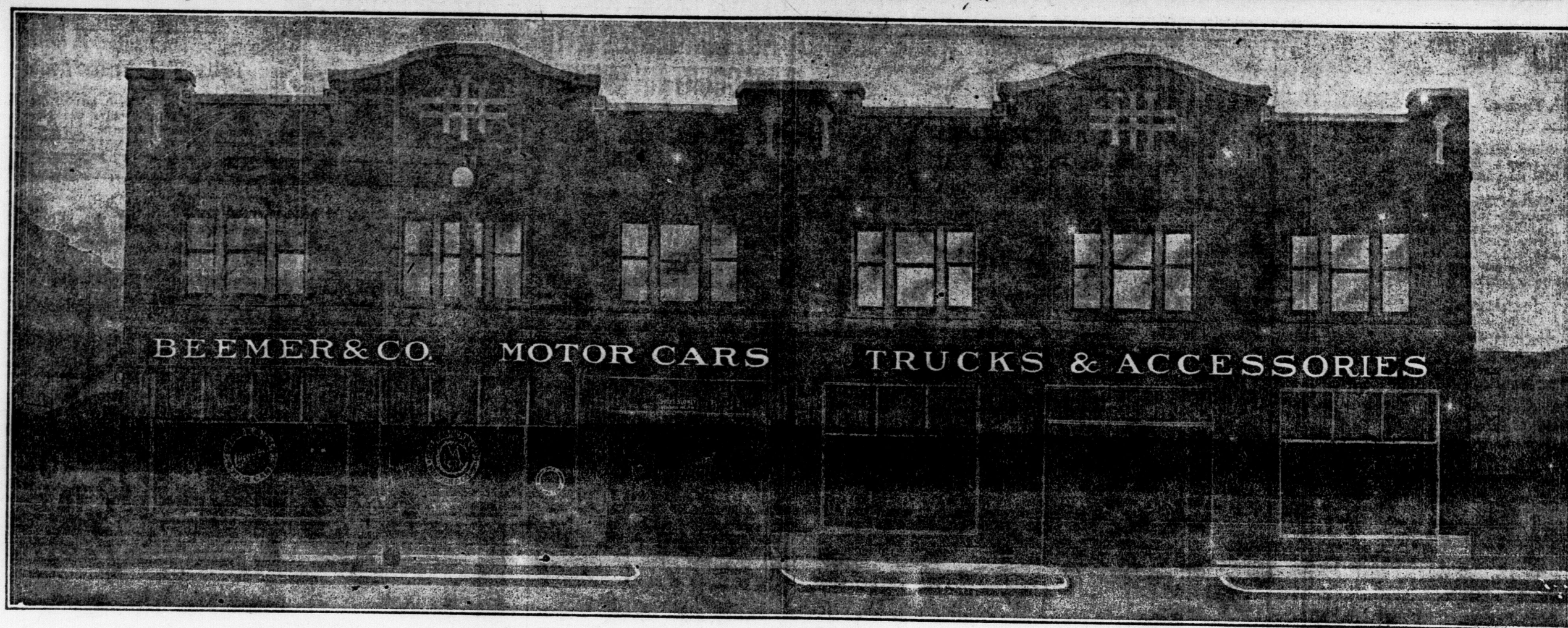




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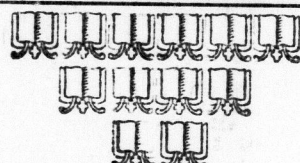
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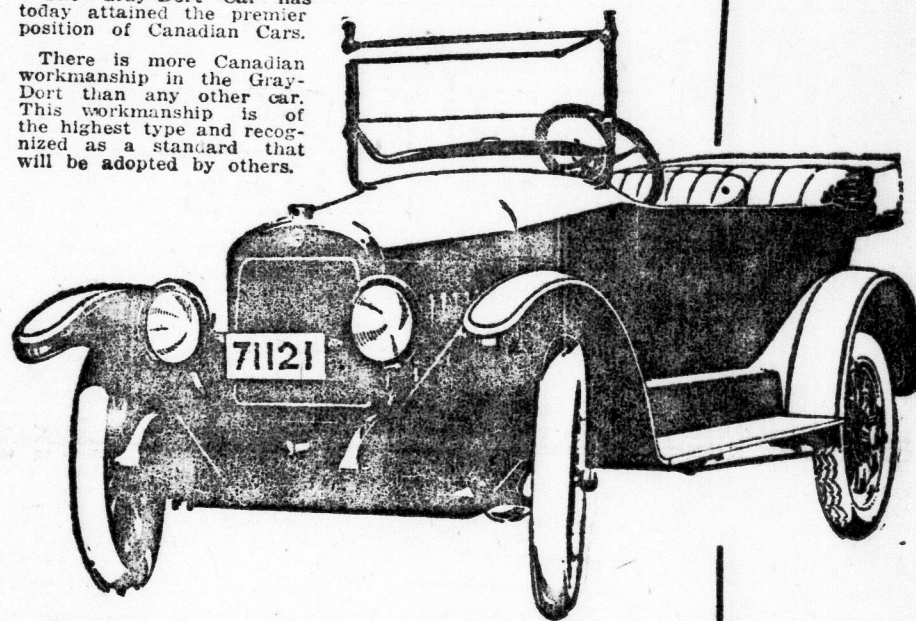

Seattle on Hard Ice and With New Attack Wins 3-1

Ottawa Prepared To Welcome
World's Champions, and
With Banquet Prepared,
Sees Series Prolonged—
Next Game in Toronto.

OTTAWA, March 28.—(By Canadian Press.)—Proving their claim that they are essentially a hard-ice team, the Metropolitans of Seattle on Saturday night decisively defeated the Ottawas, champions of the National Hockey League, by a score of 3 to 1, and thereby prolonged the series, the next game of which will be played in Toronto on Thursday night.

Ottawa has won two matches and Seattle one. The result of Saturday night's game was the great surprise of the Ottawa hockey season. There was not one Ottawa fan who had witnessed the two earlier games of the series who thought that the Westerners had a chance, and the majority of the 7,000 persons in the rink had gone to greet the new world's champions. In fact, the Ottawa management had arranged for a banquet for Saturday night, to celebrate the return of the Stanley Cup to the possession of the Ottawa team.

The Mets showed a complete reversal of form. They had learned much in the series, and adapted tactics similar to those of the Ottawas in Wednesday's game, and in consequence, the Senators were completely puzzled after the first fifteen minutes of play. The Mets combined brilliant individual feats with dazzling team work, and won on their merits throughout. In the earlier games of the series the Mets never varied their play. Each player rushed the same side of the rink, executed the same tricks and got

into the same position, with the result that the Ottawas were always lined up on the right spot whenever danger threatened. Saturday night all this was changed. There was variety in attack and defence, and Ottawas were helpless before it. The other hand, did not play up to form. The management holds that the men are not strong physically, and that the strain of playing two matches on extremely heavy ice told on their forwards, and they could not keep up the pace. Darragh and Nighbor left the ice in the final period completely exhausted. Walker was perhaps more responsible for the victory than any other player. He never tired and entered into every play. Rowe and Foyston were in fine form. The match established a record for Stanley Cup hockey, inasmuch as not one penalty was handed out.

J. R. Booth, Ottawa lumber magnate, has followed the fortunes of the Ottawas for more than twenty years. While the ice was much faster than in the previous games, there was a slight coating of water, but the conditions evidently suited the Mets. Ottawa opened with whirlwind speed, and gave Holmes a busy five minutes before Boucher scored. Then, for nearly ten minutes, Ottawa had the advantage, but when Foyston scored the second goal in thirteen minutes, the Westerners had clearly established superiority.

BANQUET TO OTTAWA TEAM IS POSTPONED WHEN SEATTLE WINS

Senators' Dream of Victory Is
Shattered For Time
Being.

OTTAWA, March 28.—Canadian Press.—The Stanley cup proved a veritable talisman to the Ottawas Saturday night when the Senators were soundly beaten by the Seattle Mets by a score of three goals to one in the most brilliant of the world's title series played to date. So confident were the Ottawas of victory that they had arranged for a world's championship banquet at the Chateau Laurier. The table for the Ottawa players was all laid, decorated in club colors. The famous hockey trophy occupied a place of honor, and invitations had been issued to a few of the select, including the Seattle outfit, to join in the jubilation. But the promoters of the banquet had left the Seattle players out of their calculations. This aggregation, which had been outplayed on two occasions, showed a remarkable reversal of form, and this, coupled with the fact that Ottawas showed the acrimony of the two previous games, enabled the visitors to stay the progress of the cup of the jubilation to the lips of the N. H. L. champions. The banquet was postponed.

The confidence of the Ottawas was also shared by Frank Calder, president of the N. H. L. He had the players' share of the three games done up in envelopes, with the names of the Senators attached for the winners' share. All was ready for handing over the amounts when the Seattle men upset the dope and came through victors. The division will now have to await the result in Toronto, to which point the teams move for a game on Thursday, with Thursday night fixed for the fifth game if one should be necessary. The next game will be played under western rules with seven man hockey, and with fast ice available, the westerners should have a good chance of tying up the series with some hope of coming out on the winners' end.

The winning players' share of the gates of the first three games will be \$200.07 each, and the losers \$228.45. Ten players from each club, as well as Managers Muldoon and Green, figure in the division. The club owners alone share in the receipts for the fourth and succeeding games.
