Lake Placid, N.Y., Feb. 13.—Miss Gladys Robinson of Toronto won the women's skating title at the championship meet which closed here yesterday. Miss Robinson won the title from Miss Johnson of Chicago. She took second place to Miss Johnson in the 200 yard dash and won the mile for women, giving her a grand total of 170 points. Miss Johnson had 139. Miss Mildred Trusley of Brooklyn 30, Miss Edna Webster, Toronto, 29, and Miss O. Barth of Brooklyn, 10.

A. Moore of New York City won the men's championship title with a total of 100 points. Chas. Jewtraw of Lake Placid, who recently won the United States title, was second with 87 points, and Roy McWhirter of Chicago third with 60 points. McWhirter set a new world's amateur record in winning the 500 yard event yesterday in 8 min. 40 sec. This was two-fifths of a second faster than the former record, made by John Nilsson at Montreal, in 1895.

After Disagreement Referee Awards N. Y. Dog Honors to Cocker Spaniel.

New York, Feb. 13.—(By Can. Press.)—Chosen from among twenty-one dogs that reported the best of their respective breeds, Midkiff Seductive, an 18-pound cocker spaniel bitch, owned by W. T. Payne of Kingston, Pa., was adjudged champion of the forty-fifth annual show at Westchester, Kennel Club, which closed at Madison Square Garden, so close was the contest that after the dogs had been in the ring for nearly an hour the two judges, Frank K. Swice of Toronto and Chas. H. H. Swice of New York City, could not agree on a single Spaniel held out for the cocker spaniel, and Hopton favored the Pekingese champion, Phantom of Ashcroft, owned by Edmund Garry, show, Jr., Dr. John E. Demand, who was the first judge in the history of the show that the referee honors had been won by a cocker spaniel.

Elliott of Ottawa, Ont., won the regular honors, Phantom of Ashcroft was placed in reserve just after he had been imported to the United States at a cost of \$50,000.
