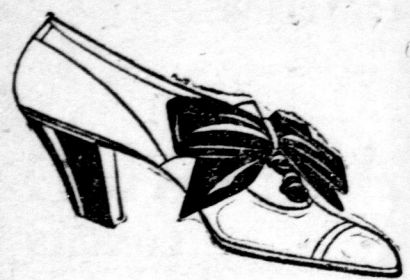

INDIFFERENT MAN AND SOCIAL EVILS

Subject of a Lecture by Dean Dumoulin Last Evening.

Dean Dumoulin, of Ohio, addressed a well-attended meeting of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, in the Memorial Church last night, and in an interesting lecture showed how very much the indifferent man is to blame for the evils which beset society today.

The indifference of the elector is the cause of political corruption, and not until the indifferent ones are awakened or are made to awaken, will any change result.

In referring to divorce on the other side of the line, Dean Dumoulin spoke with regret of the rapidly increasing number of cases, and said the reason for it is the indifference of the nation to this great evil. Indifferent men, he said, are today doing more to spread evil of all kinds than anyone has any idea of, and their influence is one which it is extremely difficult to counteract on account of modern conditions.

Lightning Struck South London Home Residence on Pipe Line Road Suffers

People in the House at the Time, But They Were Uninjured.

During the thunderstorms of last evening the home of Mrs. M. Sharp, 21 Pipe Line road, was struck by lightning.

The members of the family were in the house at the time but were not seriously effected by the crash.

The house caught fire, about \$200 damage resulting.

Shortly after 5 o'clock Mrs. Sharp and her family were in the front part of the house, and were about getting tea.

Mrs. Sharp decided to wait a few minutes until the storm was over before going into the kitchen.

A terrific crash was heard, but Mrs. Sharp paid no particular attention to it.

She had no idea her house was struck, and apart from a scare thought no more of it at the time.

Kitchen Struck.

The lightning, however, had struck the kitchen at the rear just in front of the chimney, and had run along the ridge, going down into the building.

The garret was filled with old clothes and the like, and soon became ignited.

A passerby noticed the roof on fire and turned in an alarm.

Chief Clark and the brigade responded in the driving rain, and soon had the blaze under control.

A large portion of the roof was burned away, and considerable damage was done inside.

The loss is estimated at \$200.

Had Mrs. Sharp been in the kitchen at the time, a serious accident might have resulted.

The Presbytery of London in Session

The Presbytery of London is in special session today.

The main business before the court is the rearrangement of the Delaware, Mount Brydges and Caradoc fields.

It was proposed to make a rearrangement, extending all the way from Ivan to Tempo and Muncy. It is understood that neither Ivan nor North

Caradoc are favorable to the proposed change. This may mean that the whole arrangement on which the presbytery has spent so much time and labor may fall through as Ivan and North Caradoc are the key of the situation. The Presbytery will go exhaustively into the whole matter at this afternoon's session.

The council of the town of Leamington will tender a complimentary banquet to the directors of the Windsor, Essex and Lake Shore Rapid Railway Company in the town hall of Leamington on Thursday evening at 7 o'clock. A special car will leave Windsor at 2 p.m. and will contain the officials of the road and their friends. An inspection of the road will be made, and stops will be made at Essex and Kingsville, where representatives from those places will be picked up. The affair marks the official opening of the Windsor Railway, and is an event of considerable importance. Mayor Norman Peterson, Reeve Louis Wigle and Secretary R. M. Selkirk have made excellent preparations for the affair, which promises to be a splendid function.
