Teaching the Deaf and Dumb

Science of Manual Training

An Evening Spent With the Class in Lansdowne School Where Unfortunates Are Given the Chance to be More Than Hewers of Wood and Drawers of Water.

"Buzz, buzz," and "tap, tap," goes hammer and saw as the industrious class of twenty young and middle-aged men work cheerfully, but quietly, on their models of oak, or pine, or cardboard. The case may be, talking at times, but seldom uttering an intelligible sound. Each one of them is thoroughly conversant with the science of manual training. He can spend but little time in the contemplation of the visitor, but must, after one quick, curious glance, turn back to his work.

Except for the first few lessons, Mr. Rostance believes in letting his students have absolute freedom in their work. And so it is, with the ingenuity and design displayed by them is sure evidence that his formula is the correct one. Here, in one corner of the Lansdowne school, which is a quiet, unassuming building, a quarter cut oak, everyone of its free, artistic lines the individual work of its sense-crippled creator. Beside it is in his hands a model of a cabinet, and he is busily engaged in its construction.

Three times each week, on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, this study of human anatomy is enacted in Lansdowne school, Spadina-crest, and probably nowhere else on the continent. In the manual training room of this school, the deaf and dumb of the district take lessons in carpentering and other work equally attractive to the kiddies in the day time, and where the deaf and dumb are massed together in gay profusion in a room only large enough to work in, come and observe an advanced work of deaf mute training, which is equalled in few places in the world.
