## TRYING TO DRAG THEIR GOLD FROM RELUCTANT GERMANS

Appeal Not Meeting With a Very Satisfactory Response

Amsterdam, July 27.—The daily recurring public notices printed in conspicuous type in German newspapers entreating citizens to aid the fatherland by giving it their gold, evidently is insufficient of productive results. The Weser Zeitung of Bremen publishes a renewed appeal, which is modelled upon the Russian council of similar name. "A meeting arranged for Saturday in Memorial Hall arousing bitter condemnation."

The newspapers cite examples of members of the German imperial and royal princely houses, sacrificing their gold and jewelry and says competent authorities calculate that three to four hundred million gold coins are being obstinately hoarded in Germany while the value of gold ornaments is estimated at a billion marks.

The Weser Zeitung says the public often asks whether gold cannot be loaned instead of given to the German imperial bank. The answer is no, because the law demands gold as a cover for paper money and that it must be in form of coin. The public is again urged to yield jewels of all kinds which realize good prices abroad and is most useful for credit purposes there.

THE METAL MARKETS. In its summary of the iron, steel and machinery markets for the week ended July 24, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following observations:

Developments at Washington have in many respects an important bearing on the situation in Canada and the actions of the American government are being followed closely locally on this account. The steel market is quiet and buying has fallen off pending a definite announcement in regard to prices. There is also considerable uncertainty as to the amount of steel available for private consumers after government needs have been provided for.

This uncertainty and high prices are restricting business and the market will be unsettled until the situation clears up. It is freely predicted that steel prices have about reached the top, but this depends largely on the action of the American government in its influence on the steel trade. The pig-iron market is marking time pending developments at Washington and the demand has fallen off in view of the possibility of lower prices. The local situation is unchanged and prices are still well drawn. The scrap market continues weak with a tendency to lower prices, although in the meantime quotations are unchanged. Non-ferrous metals are weaker and prices have declined throughout the list. Consumers are keeping out of the market in anticipation of lower prices following action by the American government in this direction. For this reason the markets are unsettled, and the outlook is uncertain. The machine tool market is quiet with no feature of outstanding importance.

## WORKERS' AND SOLDIERS' COUNCIL NOW IN LONDON

Newspapers Launch Vigorous Campaign Against New Association

New York, July 27.—The Sun this morning publishes the following special cable from London, dated yesterday: "The British press has launched a vigorous campaign against the newly organized workers' and soldiers' council, which is modelled upon the Russian council of similar name. 'A meeting arranged for Saturday in Memorial Hall arousing bitter condemnation.'"

"The Express editorially says: 'It is highly important that the nation should know the nature of this plot, that honest working men may be warned against having the slightest association with it. Such peace gatherings should not be allowed.'"

SIFTON ON THE JOB. Winnipeg, July 25.—Probably no other political event has ever aroused so much interest in the west as the coming western Liberal convention, judging by reports of dozens of conventions called for next week to select delegates.

Today the premier of the three prairie provinces, with several of their ministers, were in conference all day with Sir Clifford Sifton, who has arrived here. Sir Clifford is taking a lively interest in the proceedings, but whether the farmers, who will be largely represented, have forgotten his 1911 campaign against reciprocity, is much discussed. R. L. Richardson, ex-M.P., through his newspaper, the Tribune, is already starting to turn the convention against Sifton, who deserted the west in 1911 and is now a millionaire.

Conservatives are taking as keen an interest in the convention as Liberals, and there is much apprehension among them that a platform will be evolved that will rob them of their most useful ammunition.

CONSCRIPTION BILL BEFORE THE SENATE. Ottawa, July 27.—(Canadian Press).—The senate received the military service measure, from the house of commons yesterday. It was given its first reading and on motion of Sir James Loughheed the second reading was fixed for Tuesday next.

RUSSIANS PRESS BACK THE ENEMY. Petrograd, July 27.—Russian cavalry threw back the pressing Austro-German infantry on Wednesday in the region southwest of Monastyrskaya, in eastern Galicia, says the official statement issued today by the Russian war department.

The Russian announcement says the Romanians have advanced towards the upper reaches of the Sutchita river and are consolidating their gains. The Romanians took many prisoners and captured six guns.

CANADIAN GUNS GAIN ASCENDENCY. (By Stewart Lyon, special Can. Press correspondent in France.) Canadian Army Headquarters, July 27.—Our guns have at last definitely secured the upper hand on this part of the western front. The artillery actions by which this has been done have been in progress for several days.

VATERLAND SOON TO BE AT SEA AGAIN. Washington, July 27.—The big 50,000-ton German steamer Vaterland, seized at New York by the American government when war was declared on Germany, will be ready for service soon. Repairs to the ship have cost slightly less than \$1,000,000.

HAS 3,853 STUDENTS.

Official announcement is just made of the registration of students at the University of Chicago for the summer quarter, which began June 18 and ends August 31. Considering the various influences and conditions connected with the war that were expected to reduce the normal attendance greatly, the showing is regarded as a remarkable one.

In the graduate School of Arts and Literature there are 400 men and 653 women enrolled, a total of 1,053; and in the Ogden Graduate School of Science, 372 men and 126 women, a total of 498, making the total for the Graduate Schools 1,551.

In the Senior Colleges 212 men and 201 women are registered, a total of 413; in the Junior College 140 men and 134 women, a total of 274; and the unclassified students number 484, making the total for the colleges 1,181.

Is 1,807 and of women, 2,046, making a grand total for the university of 3,853.
