IS FOUND DEAD AT SIDE OF ROAD

James Baird of Titusville
Had Relatives in
St. John.

The lifeless body of James Baird of Titusville was found yesterday morning in a ditch at the side of the road near the school house at Passages. It is supposed to have been caused by a fall from a bicycle which he was riding when he left his home at Titusville on Saturday. The body was first seen by Horace Tays, who was driving home after delivering milk at the train.

The unfortunate man, who was between 30 and 35 years of age, is survived by his mother and father, the latter at present in the United States; four brothers, James, at home; William, in the United States; and Robert and Stewart of St. John; and three sisters, Mrs. Robert Campbell of Titusville, Mrs. Millidge Dunlop of Smithtown, and Miss Lottie of Upham.

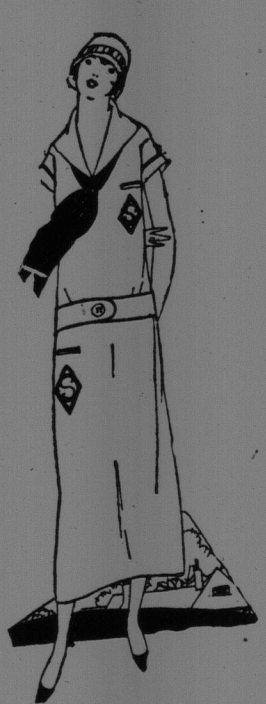

GOVERNMENT WINS ON TARIFF ISSUE

An Urban and a Rural Constituency Endorse Premier King.

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—(Special)—The Government scored two notable victories yesterday in the St. Antoine (Montreal) and Rimouski by-elections. It is true that the majorities secured respectively by W. J. Hushon and General Sir Eustace Fiset are much lower than in the general election of 1921, but majorities everywhere then were abnormal, while the vote was very much heavier.

The result causes much gratification in Government circles, for a reverse in these two seats would have had an injurious effect on the party throughout the country. The verdict of the polls in two peculiarly dissimilar constituencies—one wholly urban and the other wholly rural, one essentially English, one essentially French, is accepted here as a vindication of the Government's fiscal policy and an approval of its general performance.

In the Montreal seat the tariff was made the whole issue. Conservatives claimed that the changes made in the budget last spring are only a beginning, a movement to culminate in free trade. The Liberals denied any such intent, declaring that while they have no idea of free trade they believed in a freer trade, and consider the policy enunciated in the budget as in line with that aspiration. As the Conservative speakers warned the electorate that the choice of the Liberal candidate would be both an endorsement of and a mandate to the Government, the outcome in an essentially protectionist constituency is rather disconcerting.

St. Antoine division never returned a Liberal until Walter Mitchell won it in 1921, when the railway question and the suspected removal of Grand Trunk headquarters to Toronto operated largely to submerge party lines in Montreal. It is to be noted, nevertheless, that the redistribution of 1913 made by the Conservatives added to St. Antoine certain wards which were Liberal in tendency, and which furnished Mitchell in 1921 and Hushon today with the bulk of their majorities. The riding so consistently Conservative has been somewhat changed.

Conscription was pulled from the cupboard in Rimouski, and the attack on General Fiset was that he had much to do with the enforcement, a charge from which he side-stepped. His diminished majority, compared with that of D'Amour in 1921, is attributed to division in the local party over his nomination.

The outcome of the two bitterly contested by-elections is peculiarly stimulating to the Liberals. The Prime Minister promptly wired his warm congratulations to the victors.

Press Comment.
Le Canada, Montreal, says: "It is not possible to insist too much on the bearing of the double Liberal victory in Rimouski and St. Antoine. The King administration could not desire a more complete endorsement of its policy. St. Antoine is the most industrial division of the entire province. The Prime Minister in person came to proclaim his tariff policy in the heart of the division. He asked the people

to decide the issue and the people affirmed his policy by a majority of about a thousand. It is a complete endorsement of the Liberal policy on the very ground chosen by an opponent. In the rural county of Rimouski at the other end of the province Major General Fiset was elected by an immense majority in spite of the prejudices aroused against him. Thus, rural as well as industrial Quebec remains solidly attached to the King Government."
