London, July 21. — Remarkable scenes marked the end of the Brixton taxi cab murder trial at Old Bailey, when A. C. Mason, a youth of 22 years, was sentenced to death for the murder of Jacob Dickey, on May 9. Dickey, who was a taxi driver, was shot down by his fare after an altercation.

After the jury returned to announce the verdict, the prisoner was perfectly composed and stood up straight, facing the judge. When the foreman of the jury pronounced the word "guilty"
