PARCEL POST ADDS TO EXPORTS

Washington, Aug. 24.—The American export business by mail and parcel post is growing so rapidly that Department of Commerce officials have decided to ascertain so far as possible the extent of this business of which no statistics ever have been kept. It is believed to run into a huge sum each year, which will swell the total value of the foreign exports of the United States.

Plans have been completed to collect, beginning with January, 1924, statistics of exports by parcel post and mail which have not been collected heretofore because such exports are not cleared through custom houses. Tentative regulations, subject to approval by the Postmaster General, have been drawn up requiring business concerns in the United States exporting by mail goods valued at \$25 or over to file export declarations.

Philadelphia, Aug. 24.—A home run by Cy Williams, his 32nd of the season, enabled the Phillies to defeat Chicago today, 6 to 5. Williams hit the first ball pitched by Kaufmann in the seventh inning, the clearest of the 32 cents, and the price ranged from that to 40 cents.

The gas at this last named price was said to be of airplane quality and made starting easy. Automobile owners generally favor the lower priced gas, on account of the price and few of those who drive their own cars go in for the more expensive brands. It was the opinion of dealers yesterday that the cooler weather now would give the motorist more incentive to purchase the higher grade of gas.

The difference in price in New Brunswick and on the other side of the International border, works in a dealer's favor. The distributor claimed freight rates and the conditions caused the price to be higher here than in the United States, but the great difference in price was hardly accounted for.

In spite of the explanations offered, the motor car owners cannot see the necessity for so great a range in prices. They have read the great surplus of 19 billion gallons of gasoline in the possession of American companies and the efforts to market it without lowering the price to the consumer. When he break came they saw the price going down in the United States and the rivalry between the retailers but after several weeks they find that the Canadian consumer is to get no benefit from the rate cutting war in the country of production but the prices are kept at the high plane of early spring.

One citizen who has owned a car for several years and has toured through the province is authority for the statement that the high prices of gasoline and motor cars have been responsible for many of the younger people leaving the Maritime Provinces and going to the United States. He pointed out that Ford cars were approximately \$200 cheaper in the United States than here and that gasoline was about one-third the price.

Young people had these prices brought prominently to their notice with the result that they believed prices of other goods also ranged lower than at home. Eventually the lure of the low priced car and the cheap gasoline was successful in getting the younger people across the border and they were lost to Canada.

Automobile owners talk of action to reduce the price of gasoline here but so far no plan of action has been adopted. It is thought however that the distributors should give the consumer the benefit of the lower prices which are prevailing in the country of production.
