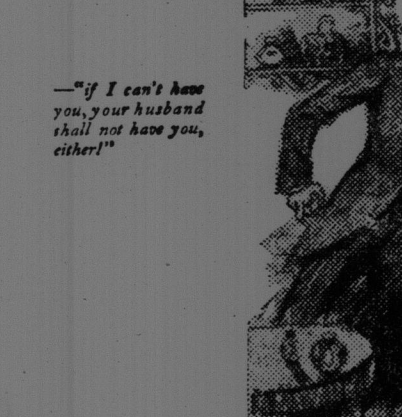

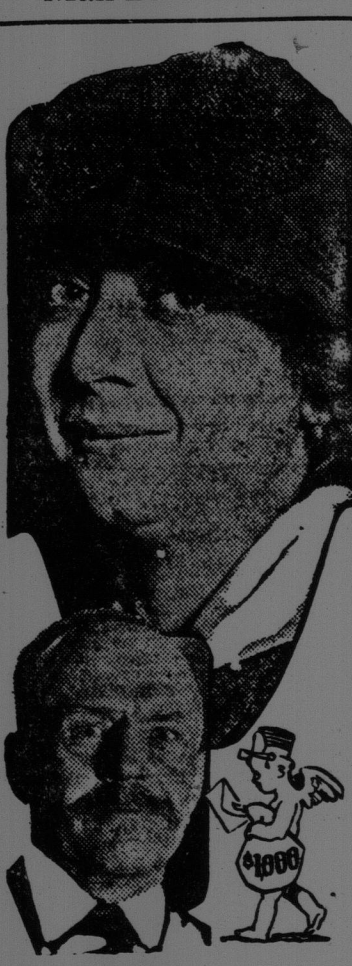

COLD ROAST BEEF.

This "Italian Salad" will be most acceptable in households devoted to roast beef.

One cup diced cooked carrots, 1-2 cup diced cooked turnips, 1 cup diced cold roast beef, 1 cup cooked string beans cut in small pieces, shredded cabbage, pickled beets, French dressing.

Make the dressing using one small teaspoon salt of one-half standard teaspoon, one-quarter teaspoon pepper, one-eighth teaspoon mustard, two tablespoons vinegar, six tablespoons oil. Mix carrots, turnips, string beans and meat and let stand in the dressing for an hour. Keep the bowl tightly covered. Arrange on a bed of shredded cabbage, garnish with pickled beets cut in fancy shapes or matchlike strips and serve very cold.

Protein, 147 calories; carbohydrate, 124 calories; fat, 408 calories. Iron, .0099 gram.

"Bubble and Squeak." Four slices cold roast beef, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 cups cold mashed potatoes, 1 cup cold spinach, 1 onion, salt and pepper.

Melt butter in frying pan. Add meat and saute a golden brown first on one side and then on the other. Remove from frying pan and keep hot. Peel and cut onion in shreds. Add to melted butter in frying pan and fry a pale straw color. Add potatoes and spinach, salt and pepper and mix thoroughly. Cook until very hot. Smooth over the top and let brown on the bottom. Remove to a hot platter and arrange the meat over the top.

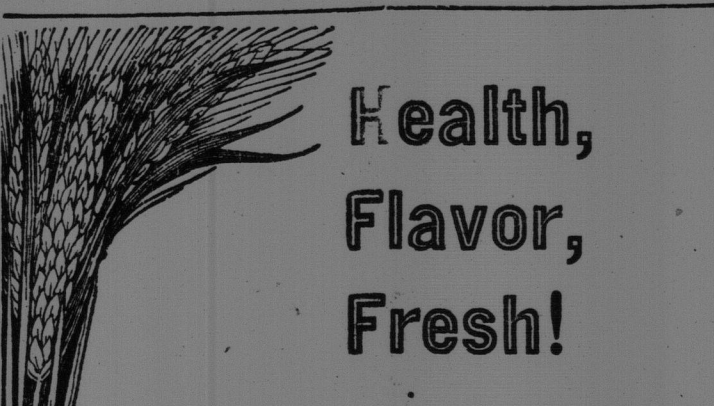

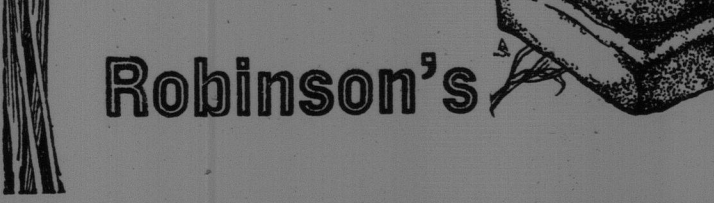

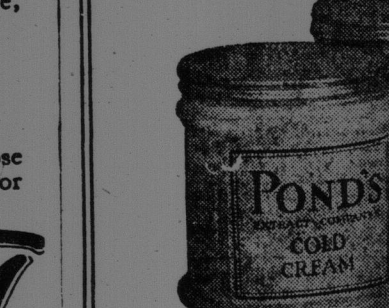
