COLD ROAST BEEF. This "Italian Salad" will be most ecceptable in households devoted to oast beef:

One cup diced cooked carrots, 1-2 cup diced cooked turnips, 1 cup diced cold roast beef, 1 cup cooked string beans cut in small pieces, shredded cabbage, pickled beets, French dress-

ing.

Make the dressing using one small teaspoon salt of one-half standard teaspoon, one-quarter teaspoon pepper, one-eighth teaspoon mustard, two tablespoons vinegar, six tablespoons oil. Mix carrots, turnips, string beans and meat and let stand in the dressing for an hour. Keep the bowl tightly covered. Arrange on a bed of shredded cabbage, garnish with pickled beets cut in fancy shapes or matchlike strips and serve very cold.


