BENNY LEONARD PUTS MITCHELL AWAY IN TENTH
Chicago, May 30.—Benny Leonard, world's lightweight champion, knocked out Pitkin Mitchell of Milwaukee last night in the twentieth round.
The Dexter Park pavilion was packed with close to 5,000 spectators. The gate receipts were around \$80,000.
In the preliminary bouts, Sammy Mandell of Rockford, Ill., had a shade the better of Frankie Garcia of Memphis, Tenn., at 126 pounds, in eight rounds.
In the second eight round preliminary, Johnny "Peewee" Kaiser, St. Louis 120 pounder, outboxed Charlie Glaser of Chicago.
Lew Hadley, a New York bantam, scored a technical knockout over Harold Smith of Chicago in the fifth of an eight round go. They boxed at 115 pounds.
Joe Burman of Chicago knocked out Patsy Hannigan of St. Louis in the third round of a scheduled ten round bout. They weighed in at 120 pounds.
Just before the Leonard-Mitchell bout, James C. Mullen, promoter of tonight's programme, was arrested on the charge of violating the anti-prize fight law. Mullen was not taken to a police station, the arrest having been previously arranged as the start of court action to test the anti-boxing law. Bond of \$5,000 was given.
In the height of a ring-side riot, Ritchie Mitchell was thrown in by the ring by the police, who also grabbed Billy Mitchell, brother-manager of the Milwaukee boxer.
Leonard out-boxed and out-slugged Mitchell throughout the contest, with the exception of the eighth and ninth rounds. Mitchell fought a defensive fight, waiting to nail the champion with a right hand punch. Leonard was forced to do most of the leading in the early rounds, while Mitchell contented himself with countering.
Mitchell had Leonard backing away second in the 100 yards dash. Frith,
