


OPPOSITION TO TARIFF MEASURE



Canadian Tariff

New York, June 28.—(By Canadian Press)—Leopold Graham, New York correspondent of "The Financial Journal," the London England, Eng. financial journal, has called his paper an estimate of the possible effect of the proposed Canadian tariff changes. HIDES INJURIES FROM MOTHER; YOUNG LAD DIES

Hurt at Ball Game and Again at Beach, Afraid the News Would Worry Parents.

Robert J. Alexander, Jr., a student at Manual Training High School, Brooklyn, died late Saturday afternoon at the Peck Memorial Hospital from injuries he received first while playing ball on Memorial Day and again on Friday, June 2, from diving in a swimming pool at Coney Island. Free from the time he received both injuries until he died he kept secret what had happened to him for fears that the news could worry his parents and cause a severe shock especially to his mother to whom he was devoted.

He was struck on the left jaw by a pitched ball and was forced to quit the game. In his dive at Coney Island he struck bottom on his head and left shoulder, which aggravated his previous injury.

It was not until last Monday his father noticed that the boy's face was swollen and his eyes inflamed. Dr. Dunham C. Jones, of 219 Avenue U, the family physician was called in and prescribed. The boy became delirious Wednesday and the following day Dr. Jones called in a specialist. An X-ray was taken and it was discovered that abscesses had formed at the base of the brain under the jaw.

The boy was removed to the hospital Friday and an operation was performed, but he died the following day. Alexander's silence cost him his life, as the doctors believe they could have saved him if he had received medical treatment in time.

CAT BITES POLICEMAN

Patrolman Kills Animal Which Attacks Him Before Crowd.

New York, June 28.—Patrolman Henry Beckmann of the West 100th street station, had his left hand bitten by the snout of a cat which attracted a crowd in front of a butcher shop at 369 Columbus avenue.

The policeman for a time amused the crowd by his efforts to catch the cat, until the animal leaped at him. The policeman warded it off, but not until it had bitten the middle finger of his right hand. Beckmann finally killed the cat with his revolver.
