triking Seamen, Some
Armed, Fight Negro Strike
Breakers and Police.

Baltimore, May 11.—Mobs of striking men, numbering 1,000 to 1,500, desecrated several attacks on non-striking workers, principally negroes, yesterday. Some of the strikers were badly beaten and 100 strikers were arrested. Many of the strikers were armed with pistols and knives. Several shots were fired and one policeman was struck with a brick. Once the policemen were temporarily overpowered and the strikers fled through the streets.

XICO AGAIN TO HAVE CONSUL IN MONTREAL

Montreal, May 11.—After a hiatus of more than a year, the Mexican republic again appointed a regular consul. Francisco Mellet has arrived to take over his duties. He strongly favors the free trade policy of the republic and hopes to get into touch with the Canadian government. He is expected to have one of the Canadian Merchant Marine vessels engaged in the West Indies trade call at that port.

WHY IS BUTTER HIGH ON THE ST. JOHN MARKET?

Montreal, May 10.—At a lower rate there was an improved demand for most immediate wants and a fair trade was done with sales of finest creamery at 22c. to 22 1/2c. per lb. and seconds at 20 1/2c. to 21c. In a wholesale jobbing way prices were reduced 1c. per lb. to 20c. per lb. for solid packages, and to 18c. for 1 lb. blocks.

At the Quebec Agricultural Co-operative Society sale held at the Board of Trade there were 602 packages creamery butter offered, of which seventy-eight were sold at 22c. per lb. and the remainder at 20c. per lb. and 116 packages of finest at 27 1/2c. and 116 packages of second at 25c.

ADDRESS ON IRISH MATTERS

A. Dunn of Amherst Speaks at Self-Determination Meet- ing Here.

The regular meeting of the St. John branch of the Self Determination for Ireland League of Canada was held last evening in the K. of C. hall, Coburg street, in the presence of a large and representative audience. Mr. E. Agar was in the chair. The speaker of the evening was Augustine Dunn of Amherst, N. S. Mr. Dunn is a native of Ireland and, in previous years, an adherent of the party led by Rt. Hon. H. H. Asquith. He spoke last night for an hour and a half, going into detail into the causes of the present situation in Ireland and of the sincere efforts of Mr. Asquith to pass the Home Rule bill in 1914, and thus bring peace and contentment to Ireland, efforts which he said were frustrated by Sir Edward Carson and his friends supported by English clergymen, financiers and political opponents of Mr. Asquith. Ireland, he said, yet demands the right to determine her own form of government, just as Canada does, and that demand, whilst it may be deferred, could not be denied. He instanced the Farmers' party in Canada as a Canadian counterpart of the movement in Ireland for self-determination.

FOUR PRIVATE BANKS IN CUBA QUIT PAYMENT

Havana, Cuba, May 11.—Three small private banks in this city suspended payments yesterday and another in the city of Camaguey closed its doors. All four had remained run by depositors for the last few days and the larger banking institutions of the island have been forced to bear heavy withdrawals.

BIG DROP IN BUTTER PRICE

Ottawa, May 11.—Creamery butter has dropped to 82 cents a pound in Ottawa. This is a drop of eight cents from the price yesterday, and a reduction of twenty-eight cents a pound in a little more than ten days.

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
