A FORMER ST. JOHN GIRL IN THE WILDS

Miss Madeline Fritz, formerly of St. John, has been chosen by the geological department of the federal government as a member of a special expedition in which she and Miss Wilson, of Ottawa, are making a 200-mile trip down the shores of Lake Winnipeg to collect fossils, for the department at Ottawa. Miss Wilson is the first woman to head such an expedition, and Miss Fritz and the guide are her only companions on her adventurous journey. The trip, which commenced about the middle of last month, is expected to last for six weeks. The party takes with it tent, camping outfit and provisions as well as geological tools. Fishing tackle, gun and revolver are also part of the equipment and the two women will supply their table with game of their own securing. Miss Fritz graduated from the Royal Victoria College, Montreal, in 1919, and since then has been teaching science in the Rockfield Park private school at Ottawa. She has shown great talent in scientific work. Her mother, Mrs. E. J. Fritz, who is spending the summer in St. John, received word from her daughter yesterday that the trip was progressing very successfully. A short stop had been made at Cat Head and the party was then at work exploring the Berens River district. No misadventures had taken place and the geologists were enjoying the expedition to the full.

A MEMBER OF BRITISH HOUSE IS SUSPENDED

London, Aug. 6.—By an overwhelming majority the government this evening jammed through the Irish crime bill, designed to restore order in Ireland. Lengthy debates preceded the voting in the house of commons but lacking the presence of Premier Lloyd George and Herbert H. Asquith they did not stir the interest which attached to yesterday's discussion and were far less acrimonious. A notable exception was a furious outburst by Joseph Devlin, Nationalist member from Belfast, who defied the authority of the house to bring him to order and precipitated an exciting scene as a result of which he was suspended. He stalked out, followed by all the other Irish members and almost the entire Labor representation. For a time it seemed as though there was no way for suppressing Mr. Devlin except removing him bodily. He was, however, a member of the House of Commons and he was not to be removed. FIVE INMATES OF BOYS' INDUSTRIAL HOME DISAPPEAR

The police of all the important centres of the province have been asked to maintain vigilance for the appearance of five inmates of the Boys' Industrial home at East St. John, who have made their escape from the institution. Among those who made their successful getaway was one who is alleged to have attempted to wreck a train on the Canadian National railway in the vicinity of Athol, near Campbellton. His name is given as Walter Babang. He was arrested before being sent to St. John on a charge of opening a switch just before the arrival of an express train. An employee of the railway, however, happened to be in the vicinity and closed the switch just in time to avert a possible disaster. Those missing from the home besides Babang are Edward Hachey, aged fifteen; John Dougherty, aged fifteen; Joshua Little, aged fifteen; of Middle Sackville, and John Cunningham, aged twelve, of Chatham.

FREE VACCINATION

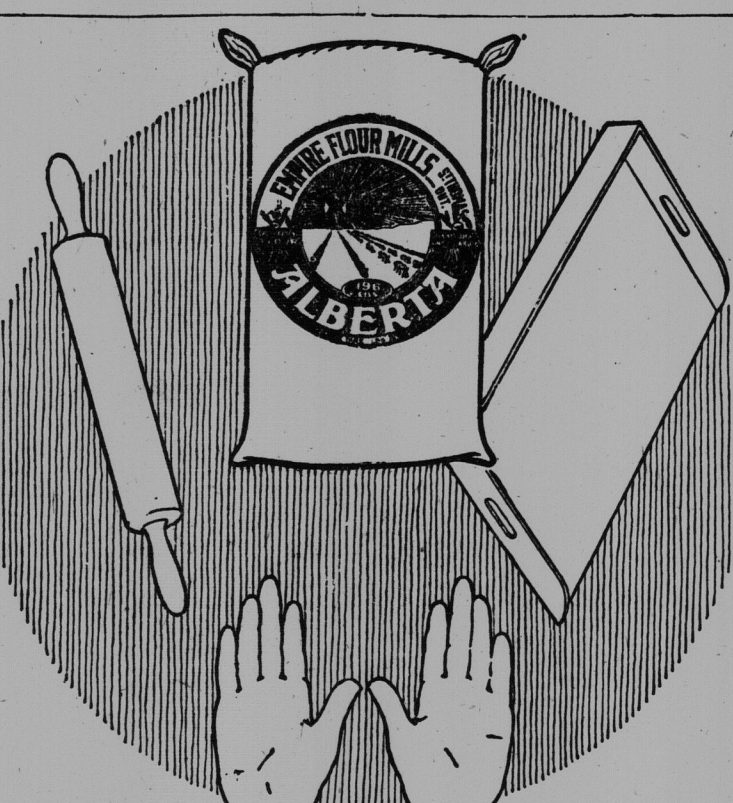
It is announced by the school board that free vaccination clinics will be held at the office of the medical inspector of the public health department, in Princess street commencing on August 12, between the hours of 1:30 and 4:30 p.m. All children seeking admission to the public schools must have a certificate of successful vaccination before they can receive a permit to attend. Early vaccination will enable the intending pupil to receive a permit at an early date and in each year there has been considerable inconvenience to pupils and their parents, not to mention the staff of the school board through delay in obtaining permits. The advice to be vaccinated early and secure a permit early is reiterated each year and of late years there has been even more heat paid to it. It is hoped that this year will show an ever greater promptness on the part of the parents.

FORMER PREMIER

PRaises the City

Hon. Crawford Vaughan, formerly premier of South Australia, was an interested and interesting visitor in the city yesterday and in the evening he delivered a powerful address at Chateau-Crawford, advocating a greater measure of democracy as a cure for industrial unrest.
Mr. Vaughan spent the morning and afternoon looking about him in St. John and was greatly impressed with the beauty of the situation of the city. Its possibilities as a beautiful spot in times to come he believed to be unlimited. The waterfront, the rocky promontories of Carleton, and Fort Howe, and the hills of East St. John appealed to him as background of wonderful charm and he expressed himself yesterday as greatly struck by their beauty and abundant resources. His own country, Southern Australia, he said, was agricultural and pastoral with an arid region lying not far inland where the annual rainfall amounted to only five inches. The country was, however, redeemed by the large artesian basin which covered an area six times the size of the British Isles. Southern Australia he considered one of the most prosperous of the Australian states with a population of about 460,000.

F. A. Campbell, the chairman, presided at the meeting of the Trades and Labor council last evening. A letter was read from Mayor Schofield in which he announced that he would meet with a committee from the council on Tuesday morning to talk over matters affecting the machinists' strike. A committee was appointed to secure a booth at the Exhibition for the Trades and Labor Council. Several new delegates were seated at the meeting and routine business was transacted.
