Great Lakes, Ill., Sept. 21—America's stars of the athletic world made their farewell appearance until the end of the war, today, when they competed in the senior championships of the National A. A. U. outdoor track and field games, at the Great Lakes Naval training station. Athletes representing clubs, universities and army and navy camps, throughout the country, were in the competition, numbering among them every star not already in France.



#### AMERICAN TORPEDOED; 64 OF CREW MISSING.

Coruna, Spain, Sept. 23—Three officers and twenty-seven of the crew of the American steamer Buenaventura, 4,881 tons, have arrived here. The vessel was torpedoed on last Monday. Three boats with sixty-four of the crew are missing. The Buenaventura was proceeding from Bordeaux where she had unloaded petroleum from Philadelphia.

The vessel belonged to the United States Steel Products Company.

One of the ablest soldiers the war has produced does not speak for himself, or about himself. He praises others, and is slow to censure. Sometimes his government has failed to send him reinforcements when his need of them was sore; but he has not complained. In more than four years of war he has always been at the front, engaged with rare respite in what may be called intensive fighting, often of the most desperate character.
