U. S. MINISTER TOO TALKATIVE FOR HIS POSITION

Washington, July 6.—Formal announcement of the resignation of George Fred Williams as minister to Greece and Montenegro was made today at the state department.

Secretary Bryan issued this statement without comment.

"Mr. Williams requests Secretary Bryan to tender to the president his resignation as minister to Greece and Montenegro. He says the reason for his resignation is that he cannot comment upon the situation in Albania as he would like under the restraint imposed by his diplomatic position, and that he does not want that he can conscientiously keep silent with the knowledge which he has of what is being done.

"He says that he considers the success of the president more important to the world than all of the efforts of other men, and does not wish to embarrass him and wishes to thank him for the confidence which has been shown him.

President Wilson is expected to accept the resignation tomorrow and close the brief and extraordinary career of Mr. Williams as a diplomat.
