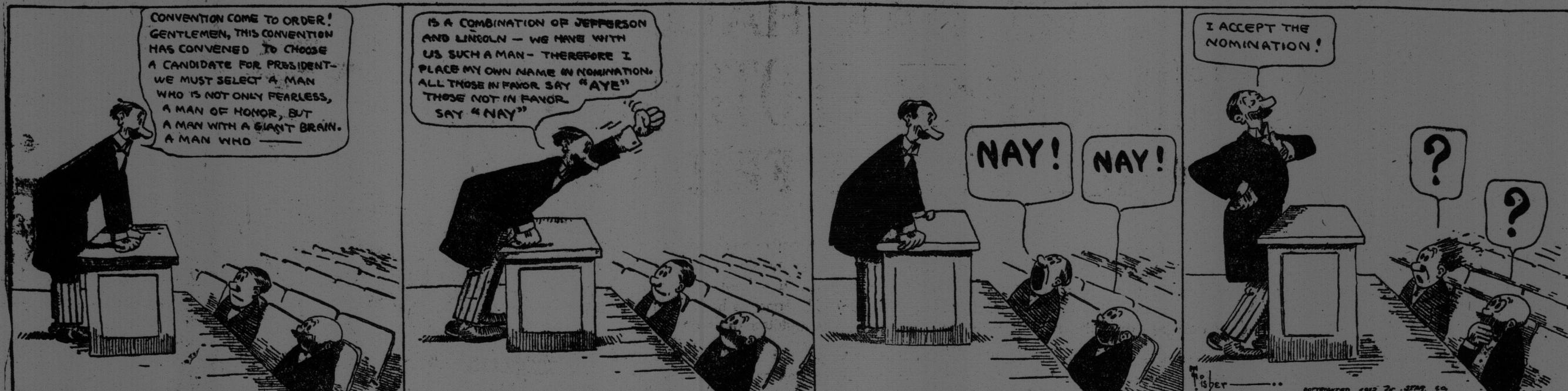


Mutt Tries to Steal His Own Convention

This bout will be staged by the Saskatoon Athletic Club in Saskatoon, and will be for the heavyweight championship of Canada. The date of the exhibition is August 8. Each boxer will post one thousand dollars and the Saskatoon Athletic Club will post two thousand dollars.
