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St. Peters Lose.


redericton defeated St. Peters in two res at the capital yesterday. The rnoon score was 6-4, and the evening All-Stars Victors.



Benjamin Block, owner of Morvich, announced after the three-year-old son of Runnymede and Hymir had finished last in a field of four in the Fall High-weight Handicap, that he would retire the colt for the remainder of the cur-rent racing season. "I believe," said Mr. Block, "that if Morvich had been gifted with the power of speech he would have said to me after his winning the race in the Kentucky Derby in May that he had endured a long, hard preparation, extending over weeks, for that fixture, and he wanted and deserved a rest. I had said, however, after the colt's vic-tory is the United States Hotel stakes at Saratoga last year that his racing qualities belonged to the public, and so, sensing the interest in seeing him in action, I allowed him to be kept at hard work getting ready for his two later races here and at Latonia. At no time since May have I felt that Morvich was at his best. He deserves a rest and now he is going to have it.
