> TO PREVENT SEALING. United States Wants a Close Season During the Whole of 1895.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 20 .- The government has invited all maritime nations to join it in preventing pelagic sealing for one year, to prevent the utter destruction of the seal'herd in Behring sea. If the foreign governments agree to this it is believed that the seals will multiply sufficiently to allow seal hunting in 1896 This action is the result of the visit of Assistant-Secretary Hamlin to the seal islands. The North American Commercial company has also been notified to suspend the killing of seals for one year. England and Portugal have forwarded favorable answers.
