3. Salvage Bay, District of Bonavista, to be re-named EAST PORT.
4. Little Beaver Cove, District of Fogo, to be re-named PORT ALBERT.
5. Samson, Bonavista Bay, to revert to its original name of FLAT ISLAND.

General Post Office

Rates of Commission on Money Orders.

The rates of commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland to the Office of the Postmaster General, Canada and any part of Newfoundland are as follows:

For sums not exceeding \$10 - 5 cts
Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20 - 10 cts
Over \$20 but not exceeding \$30 - 15 cts
Over \$30 but not exceeding \$40 - 20 cts
Over \$40 but not exceeding \$50 - 25 cts
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$60 - 30 cts
Over \$60 but not exceeding \$70 - 35 cts
Over \$70 but not exceeding \$80 - 40 cts
Over \$80 but not exceeding \$90 - 45 cts
Over \$90 but not exceeding \$100 - 50 cts

Maximum amount of a single Order to any of the above countries and at offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires.

Under the provisions of "The War Measures Act, 1914," His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to order that the following Regulation shall come into effect as and from the sixth day of December, 1916.

December 1, 1916.

No person in Newfoundland shall be permitted on and after the sixth day of December, 1916, to be in possession of any issue, either published since the first day of November, 1916, or hereafter published, of the following newspapers, namely:

New York American (Daily); New York Journal (Daily); Boston American (Daily); Boston Sunday American (Sunday); Chicago Examiner (Daily); Chicago Sunday Examiner (Sunday); Chicago American (Daily); San Francisco Examiner (Daily); San Francisco Sunday Examiner (Sunday); Los Angeles Examiner (Daily); Los Angeles Sunday Examiner (Sunday); Los Angeles Herald (Daily); Atlanta Georgian (Daily); Atlanta American (Sunday).

Any person convicted of a violation of this Regulation before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars, or in default of payment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or to both fine and imprisonment.

Published by Authority

Under the Provisions of the War Measures Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to order that the Regulations, published in the ROYAL GAZETTE under date 17th October last, in connection with Prevention of Measures taken against the incursions of hostile ships of war, be suspended as from the 15th November instant.

These Regulations comprised, amongst other things, the closing of the port and harbor of St. John's at night, and the extinguishing of the lights at certain light houses, and in the city of St. John's.

234 Private Hubert Greenland, Bare need, was reported last Friday as being dangerously ill of diphtheria at the 20th Stationary Hospital at Rouen, Jan. 20th.

Arthur R. White, seaman of the Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve, lost his life in H. M. S. Launceston. He belonged to St. George's. The body has been recovered and buried at Buncrana, County Donegal, Ireland.

Mr. Edward Roach, of Coley's Point, who had been to the General Hospital, St. John's, undergoing an operation, returned here by Saturday night's train. Mr. Roach is in a very weak condition, and his recovery is very doubtful.

The scho. "L. H. B." Capt. Isaac Battle, fish laden for Europe, left St. John's on Oct. 27th, and has not since heard from. The news of the sinking of the Duchess of Cornwall by a German raider revived hope that the crew of the "L. H. B." may yet be alive and held as prisoners at some German port.

The German laborers and mechanics were away in the majority, so far as numbers go, but it was the well-to-do ones of the military and commercial classes who controlled things and had the power to declare war. The masses are the greatest sufferers. Some time, not in the distant future either, the masses of Germany will rise and hurl those of the military caste from their high seats forever.

Labor Men Ask Borden to Resign

London, Ont., January 18.—A resolution condemning the conduct of the war by the Dominion Government, charging that there are laxity and inefficiency and waste, that there are too many high salaries and a desire to safeguard the wealthy, while labor is being forced, through the National Service scheme, to enter the army, was passed by the Trades and Labor Council here tonight.

The resolution was drafted along the lines of another recently adopted by the Trades and Labor Council of Regina.

The Labor men asserted that the Government has proven its ineptitude, and that the people are being plundered. The resolution terminates by calling upon Premier Borden and his Government to hand their resignation to the Governor-General, that a coalition embodying representatives of Labor may be organized. The claim was made that certain classes are amassing fortunes from the blood of the poor.

Another resolution, calling for the nationalization of all railways and telegraph and telephone companies was carried, and, with the first, was sent to every member of the Dominion House.

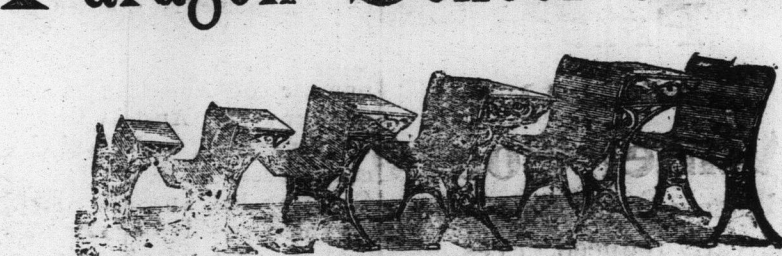
