Mr. Seabrook said it would not be to the interest of the city to keep this pipe for a few more years and then use it. If the city would sell it the Iron Works Company would take it off their

The mayor said that to accept the price suggested by Mr. Seabrook the city would be losing \$2,100 on the original cost.
