Large Number of Exhibits at the Bench Show of Victoria Kennel Club.

All Classes of Exhibits at the Bench Show Are Judged.

The bench show of the Victoria Kennel Club, now being held in the Philharmonic Hall, Fort street, deservedly ranks among the very best ever held on the Pacific coast, and in point of number and quality of entries is easily the best ever held in British Columbia. The energy with which the club went to work to secure special prizes and the other inducements they have offered to exhibitors has resulted in many champion dogs being sent from California and Washington, while the number of local dogs is much larger than usual.

The judges are Mr. Hedley Chapman and Mr. H. T. Payne, of San Francisco, the former judging the St. Bernards, mastiffs and Newfoundlands, and Mr. Payne all other classes. The work of the judges is no sinecure, and it is inevitable that some dissatisfaction should be expressed, but it is quite certain that judges have been actuated by the very best motives, and their decisions will bear revision. Some of the exhibitors incline to the opinion that it is impossible for one man to be an expert in more than one or at most two classes of dogs, but it is not likely that a man of Mr. Payne's experience will be very far out of his reckoning.

The Philharmonic hall is a perfect Babel as far as sound goes, but the arrangements of the exhibits in regard to the convenience of both exhibitor and spectator are everything that can be desired. Great credit is due the management for the good work in this respect.

Perhaps the exhibits which are attracting the greatest attention are the big St. Bernards, and of these there are several notable examples: Among the local Fritz. Bitches, first, Oscar C. Bass's Meldogs should be especially mentioned Mr. bourne; reserve, James Fletcher's Babe. Pferdner's, Mr. J. J. Randolph's and Mr. A. E. Greenwood's, the latter's "Dude," or Tudor, as he is entered aristocratically, being a particularly handsome puppy, and likely to be heard of again.

There is a plethora of cocker spaniels, and the local exhibitor, Mr. J. W. Creighton, has more than held his own against the celebrated breeders of California. In fox terriers Rev. J. W. Flinton is again the leading exhibitor and will doubtless repeat his former successes when the results are made known.

In Gordon setters, "Melbourne," the winner of the Times cup, (and the only dog to keep one of the cups at home), is one of the few remaining aristocratic pioneer setters at Victoria. She is, with her brother "Bang," the only living direct survivor of the stock imported by the late Sir Matthew Begbie, and shows her breeding in every point. Her only drawback is that she is a trifle under the standard in height, but in marking and general build she holds with anything shown in British Columbia. The Senator has been unresponsive except that five cents a week was docked from the price of his paper, the Times, to meet the Globe's cheaper rate; and the Semlin ministry also has survived the assault, which cost several thousand doilars hard cash.-Nelson Tribune. (The Globe cost some of its promoters not less than \$10,000; others again put up-nothing.)


