Miramichi Advance. CHATHAM, N. B., APRIL 6, 1893. Several columns of local and other matter had to be held over this week to make room for the report of the discussion in the Assembly on the school question.

Parliament was prorogued on Saturday last, after a session of sixty-five days. It was one of the shortest since Confederation.
