VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass, Dec. 19—
Sch Jessie Lena, from Barren Island
for St. Andrews, NB, reports the loss of
her foresail during a northerly gale in
Long Island Sound yesterday.

The tug Lord Wolseley had her prop-
eller broken at Musquash on Tues-
day and is now in Lower Cove being
repaired. The tug was sent down to
the Musquash river to assist the tug
Kingsville in towing some scows of
pulp. Considerable ice had formed,
and the tug experienced great diffi-
culty in cutting her way through it.
The loose ice, which was in fairly
large cakes, greatly interfered with
the tug, and the Wolseley had its prop-
eller snapped off at the hub by strik-
ing a submerged cake. The tug Mil-
dred was sent down to tow the Wolse-
ley to the city.
The owners of the tug W. H. Mur-
ray would not send their steamer
down, as it was thought the work was
too risky.
Men around the harbors on the Fun-
dy coast think there would be found
considerable use for an ice breaker.
The tug Kingsville is still at Mus-
quash.

CONSERVATIVE ELECTED IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Dec.
19.—In the provincial by-election today
in the first district of Queens, for the
seat of the late Hon. George Simpson,
the Liberal, whose majority in the
general election of 1904 was 38, Mur-
dock Kennedy (Conservative) was elec-
ted over John S. Connors (Liberal),
by a majority of 45. Kennedy made
big gains at polls where he and his re-
latives had extensive business inter-
ests. The Conservatives made a dead end
on the district.

A. A. McLean, M.P., came from Ot-
tawa to take part in the campaign.
They took a strong ground against the
increase in the Dominion railway for
the province, claiming the Liberals did
not secure enough.

SOLID GOLD WATCH FOR F. N. PERKINS

At the regular meeting of Court
Yukon, No. 73, held last evening, Bro.
F. N. Perkins, the financial secretary,
was presented on behalf of the mem-
bers of the court with a solid gold
watch. District Organizer Bro. D. R.
Kennedy, sr., in making the presen-
tation spoke at some length on the plea-
sant relations which existed between
the members and Bro. Perkins. He also
in his remarks informed the members
that this had been the most successful
year in the history of the order, and
that it was largely due to such mem-
bers as Bro. Perkins. In responding
Bro. Perkins, who was taken comple-
tely by surprise, thanked the members
in a very feeling manner.

received, and the following officers
were elected for the ensuing year:
Chief ranger, D. R. Kennedy, Jr.; vice
chief ranger, R. B. Stackhouse; an-
secretary, F. N. Perkins; rec. secretary,

W. Henry King; J. W. J. N. McKin-
ney; S. B. J. D. Speight; J. B. Bond;
Stackhouse; court physician, G. G. Mel-
vin, M. D.

The scow load of scrap iron which
was sunk at the intercolonial pier was
raised yesterday. In raising the scow,
however, a piece of it broke off—about
15 feet. One portion of the scow was
hauled up in Gregory's slip and beach-
ed, while the other will be brought into
the slip today. It is now lying under
water at the head of the slip. Mr.
Bruckhoff, president of the Portland
Rolling Mills, the consignee of the
iron, said last evening he could not tell
how much of it had been lost until it
was checked up. After the iron has
been discharged the scow will be put
on the blocks and repaired.
