

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 163 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situate. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he se desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader, has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined at meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(6) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.

The Order of the Chrysanthemum, which the Japanese emperor is going to send to President Fallieres of France as a memento of the signing of the recent important Franco-Japanese treaty, is the highest distinction which the mikado has at his disposal in the way of orders and honors. Like the English Order of the Garter, it is only conferred outside the Japanese empire on kings, emperors and distinguished heads of states. It cannot, however, compare in length of years and in historial associations with the Garter, having only been founded about thirty-two years ago by the present emperor himself. None the less it is a handsome decoration, the broad band of ribbon over the shoulder being of red silk, with a violet border.
