LONDON, Sept. 18—A despatch from Simia gives more details of the explorations of Sven Hedin into Tibet. ships because of the weather encou ered. At one time incessant snow literated everything. The temperature was 39.8 centigrade. The feet of the explorer were partly frozen and all the sheep taken with the caravan for food died. No sign of life was seen for sixty-four days.
