The All St. John hockey team returned to the city on the C. P. R. at noon today after the game at Fredericton last night. They were unable to make arrangements with Maryville for a game with their team.

On the other hand McDonald claims that McDonald owes him \$2. The case took up some time in the civil court and was adjourned until next Thursday.

### SACKVILLE WOODSMAN WAS BADLY INJURED

Entangled in Chain and Dragged by Horse—Bank Charges—J. E. Atkinson Dead.

SACKVILLE, N. B., March 11.—While in the lumber woodsman, of Upper Sackville, met with a bad accident which resulted in the breaking of his collar bone, serious injury to one of his wrists and hands and various minor bruises. Hicks was engaged in making logs when the horse which he was driving started suddenly, and Hicks' wrist was caught in the chain which was in use. He dragged some little distance until he struck an obstruction. The blow broke the collar bone but it also had the effect of freeing him from the chain though as this happened his wrist and hand were badly torn.

J. Hale Strong, of Summerside, who has been teller in the Bank of Nova Scotia here, has been transferred to the head office of the bank in Toronto. Mr. Strong has been succeeded as teller by J. Pinder, of Fredericton. Mr. Pinder has come to Sackville from the Port Bland branch of the bank.

After a short illness of pneumonia, John E. Atkinson passed away last night at the home of his brother, Alister Atkinson. Deceased was about sixty years of age, and is survived by four sons, one in Winnipeg, one in Philadelphia, Bradford in Point De Bute, and Frank, an I. C. R. agent at Blonfield, his brother, and his sister, Mrs. Stevenson, in Moncton.

The marriage of Miss Joy Charteris, of Point Du Chene, to J. W. S. Black, of Middle Sackville, will take place at Point Du Chene on next Wednesday.

### CHIPMAN TRITES IS DEAD AT MONCTON

MONCTON, Mar. 11.—The death occurred here this morning at the hospital of Chipman Trites, aged 67, he having been brought here Saturday to undergo an operation, but owing to the physical condition of the patient at that time, the physicians in attendance deemed it unwise to perform the operation, death resulting from gangrene. Deceased was well known in city and country, having for years been a representative of Moncton parish at the county council. He once conducted a meat stall in the market here. He is survived by a wife, five sons and two daughters.

### SLIGHT FIRE AT GIBSON

FREDERICTON, N. B., Mar. 11.—A fire at the residence of John Gibson, Maryville, early this morning, badly gutted one of the parlors and its contents. Mrs. Gibson was awakened at three o'clock by the smell of smoke and gave the alarm. The blaze was quite brisk, having originated from a Frandis stove in the parlor, and the house had a narrow escape from destruction.

### TWO MORE TRAMPS ARE DUMPED ON ST. JOHN

One Has a Sore Leg, the Other is Only Tired—Both are Undesirable.

The central police station, which is becoming a resort for tramps who, on application, are given comfortable quarters, has two boarders today. One is James Bell, who says he is a native of Halifax, but has resided in Maine for eight years. A short time ago he was discharged from a Maine hospital where he was treated for a broken leg. Bell arrived in the city yesterday and is without home or money. He says that his leg is very sore and he is attempting to get in the General Public Hospital.

The other tramp is a 21 years old English lad named Gard, who was arrested last night for vagrancy. He informed the court that his home is in Montreal and that he arrived here three weeks ago as a cattleman. He says there is no work here and there is nothing to do in England. Some nights he stopped at the Salvation Army shelter, but other nights he stayed in box cars or sheds. The young man is a healthy and strong looking fellow, but has the appearance of a person who would rather beg for food than earn it. The magistrate said there were too many of these tramps being dumped in on St. John and he gave instructions to the officer to make further inquiry regarding Gard and to see if the C. P. R. would take him out of the city.

### ST. JOHN MERCHANT'S SUCCESS IN BOSTON

H. W. DeForest Went There With Exhibit Two Years Ago and Quick Growth of Business Has Kept Him There.

An example of the success which St. John business men achieve both at home and abroad, is found in the big trade which H. W. DeForest has in the last two years built up in Boston.

A couple of years ago Mr. DeForest went to Boston with a display of his trade goods. The show which was held there, the demand for his goods which arose from the exhibit made it necessary for him to spend some time there looking after his interests. Since then the business has grown so steadily and so rapidly that he has found it necessary to devote almost his entire time to it. At present his time is being sold in over 100 stores in Boston and its suburbs. The growth of the business around Boston has been so rapid that he has not had time to make further extensions, but it is expected that this will come in time.

The firm is carried on a large business in Maine. This is directed from St. John, but the firm has a large warehouse at Portland for distributing purposes.

At the same time the business in the Maritime Provinces has been growing steadily.

### IN THE COURTS

In the county court chambers this morning the matter of the claim of M. S. Brown and Company, the Montreal Cawellers, against the estate of T. L. Coughlan, an insolvent, was again before Judge Forbes. A compromise was effected and the matter now finally settled. The claim was for over \$1000 and the compromise was \$600. J. King Kelly appeared for the assignees and L. P. T. Tilley for the claimant.

In equity court chambers yesterday J. E. Sanford was heard by Referee Charles F. Sanford in the case of Earle vs. Harrison. The lawyers interested were D. M. H. C. J. A. Barry, Busten and French and C. F. Inches.

The referee will shortly present his report to his honor Chief Justice Barker.

### BOARDS MEET TOMORROW

The Board of Works will hold a special meeting at City Hall tomorrow afternoon. Among the matters to be considered will be the estimates for the coming year.

A meeting of the Treasury Board will be held in Toronto, on March 14th, which it is said will be the first national missionary convention ever held.

TOLEDO, O., Mar. 11.—As a result of the probing into the affairs of the defunct German Insurance Company, the Lucas county grand jury yesterday returned five indictments against Judge Michael Donnelly, president of the company. Two of the indictments charged perjury, two embezzlement and one embezzlement and obtaining money by false pretenses. Donnelly is judge of the circuit court in the third judicial district of Ohio. The company was barred from doing business in Ohio last December.
