## FAST HOCKEY IS PROMISED


Tonight's Game With Acadia Likely to Prove a Hummer--Locals Strengthened by Return of Patterson.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

By Order of the Common Council of the City of Saint John. PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that a Bill will be presented for assent at the next Session of the Provincial Legislature entitled "An Act respecting the City of Saint John and the Police Court of said City," and to amend the Act 22 Victoria, Chapter 27. The principal objects desired to be attained by this Act, are: (1) To enlarge the jurisdiction of the City Court of Saint John so that it shall include actions of debt upon specialty or otherwise and also upon actions of special assumpsit where the sum demanded does not exceed \$200, and in actions of Tort to real and personal property where the damages claimed do not exceed \$50; (2) To provide that any process out of the said Court may be served anywhere within the County of the City and County of Saint John; (3) To provide that in contested Suits in the said Court the defendant shall file with the Police Magistrate or deliver to the Plaintiff the particulars of his defence, at least one day before the day appointed for hearing the cause; (4) To provide that application may be made to the Police Magistrate, after the expiration of 24 hours notice thereof, to postpone a cause pending in said Court; and also that the defendant in any cause may make application for discharge from custody because of defect or insufficiency in the affidavit filed to hold to bail; (5) To provide that all process of the said Court may be executed either by the Sheriff of the City and County of Saint John or any Constable of the City of Saint John or of the City and County of Saint John; (6) To provide for the taking of evidence by a shorthand reporter in the Police and City Courts.
