MARINE NOTES OF THE WORLD

THE SHIPPER ARRIVES.

The Manchester line steamer Manchester, Capt. Perry, arrived in port yesterday morning from Manchester and docked at No. 6 berth. She brought over 2,700 tons of general cargo. The ship left Manchester on the 5th of December and made an average speed of 11 knots an hour all the way across. The weather on the Atlantic was very rough and high seas and heavy gales were encountered and several large icebergs were passed. The weather in the Bay of Fundy was very mild. On her return to Manchester the boat will lay up for six weeks for general inspection and repairs.

FIRST TRIP THIS SEASON.

The C. P. R. line steamer Montrose arrived in St. John about 10.30 o'clock yesterday morning from Antwerp, in charge of Captain G. S. Webster. The Montrose encountered very heavy weather coming across the Atlantic, but the weather in the Bay of Fundy was all that could be desired. The Montrose brought five second-cabin passengers and 178 steerage passengers and 3,500 tons of general cargo. The passengers were mostly Bulgarians and Russians. The officers of the ship this year are: Chief officer, H. Head; first officer, H. J. Ferguson; second officer, R. G. Mowatt; third officer, T. Sale; chief engineer, G. A. Vine; purser, F. Philpot, surgeon, T. M. Crawford, and chief steward, R. V. Humphries. The ship will sail on Wednesday next week for Antwerp via Halifax.

FOURTEEN CHINAMEN.

On the steamer Kwara, now in port, and engaged in the South African service, are some fourteen Chinese, none of whom are permitted to land during the steamer's stay in port on account of the immigration laws. The yellow people, despite the criticisms which are levelled against them, appear to make efficient seamen.

THE BATTLE LINE.

The Battle line steamer Sellasia, Capt. Hatfield, sailed yesterday from Antwerp for Montreal. The steamer Padosia, Capt. Wright arrived at Antwerp yesterday from Hull. The steamer Eretia, Capt. Crossby, sailed from Port Talbot on the 19th for Rosario.

PORTLAND SHIPPING.

Another cargo of coal for the Grand Trunk arrived Friday. The steamer Hochelega coming from Liverpool, C. B., with 7,200 tons, which will be discharged at the pockets, where she will be docked this morning. As when here before the steamer has an almost entire crew of Chinamen, and officers will be stationed on board while she is discharging to see that none of the Chinamen come ashore. Capt. Tudor having special reasons for being vigilant in that direction owing to an incident which occurred on a recent trip to Boston, he having been fined \$500 for allowing two of the Chinamen a few minutes shore leave, just long enough to go up to the head of the dock to purchase tobacco.


SHIPPING FEDERATION.

Laborers employed by the Shipping Federation are gradually enabling the ships which have been tied up at Dublin by the strike to resume their sailings. The Intishoven Head, which has been delayed at Dublin for several weeks, was discharged by Shipping Federation laborers and sailed for St. John last Monday, where she is due by the 22nd inst. In spite of the fact that the strike is not yet over, the Bray Head will sail from Sydney for St. John today, where she will load a full cargo for Dublin. She should arrive before the strike is settled she also will be discharged by laborers employed by the Shipping Federation. —Montreal Gazette, Dec. 19.

NORTH SHORE ROSES WELL KNOWN CITIZEN

Death of Thomas W. Butler Occurred Saturday— Organizer for Conservative Party.

Newcastle, Dec. 22.—Thomas W. Butler, barrister clerk of the peace, died at his home in Avoca, five miles from here, Saturday evening, of complications. Deceased was 41 years of age, and had practised law here for the last 18 years, having one of the largest law practices in the province. During the last few months his health had been very poor, and he had gone to Hotel D'Orleans, Chatham, for treatment, but returned home a few days ago. A widow, formerly Miss Mary Holohan, native of Newcastle, with three sons survive. Deceased was born in Melrose, Westmorland Co., and was educated in the common schools of that place and in St. Dunstan's College in Charlottetown. He studied law with W. A. Russell, of Shediac and shortly after becoming an attorney removed to Newcastle, where he was rapidly in his profession, and in the councils of the Liberal-Conservative party of which he was a most active member and effective campaign speaker and organizer. In 1911 he was asked to allow his name to go before the Conservative convention, but he refused to do so and pledged his support to Hon. Donald Morrison. He was likewise mentioned as a candidate for provincial honors on the Independent Conservative ticket. He was dependent on law and politics, he found time to take an active interest in Agriculture, (having a fine farm at Avoca) and the Board of Trade, and also at times taken part in local journalism. In the town council of Newcastle, in 1911 and 1912, Mr. Butler stood for Tax Reform and the abolition of all property qualification for the offices of Mayor and Alderman. The death of John Mansdown occurred yesterday morning at the age of 80 years and 9 months. Deceased had retired from active work about a year ago, but had not been ill long. He was a native of Longville from which he had removed here some 30 years ago. His wife, who was Miss Annie Donahue, predeceased him three years ago. The following children survive: John, Golden, B. C. Edward and Joseph, at home, Ephraim, Bangor, Me., and Mrs. Wm. Kane, of South Brewster, Me. The funeral was held in St. Mary's R.C. Church, Tuesday at 9 a.m.

NEW PASTOR INDUCTED AT DALHOUSIE CHURCH

Rev. Dr. Polley, of Eureka, N. S., Assumes Charge of St. John's Presbyterian Congregation.

Dalhousie, Dec. 22.—On Friday evening Rev. Dr. Polley, of Eureka, N. S., was inducted pastor in the St. John's Presbyterian Church here. Rev. Mr. Jobb, of Charlottetown, gave the charge to the new pastor, and Rev. Mr. Mathews, of Newcastle addressed the people. Mr. and Mrs. Polley are the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Haddock, the two sons are the guests of Mrs. Alex. McKenzie and the two daughters are the guests of Mrs. D. McDonald. The manse is at present being put into proper shape. Miss Annie McInerney left on Saturday for Exton, where she will spend her holidays. Grace McEwen, of Misgouha, P. Q., who is attending the public school here, left for her home on Thursday, crossing the Restigouche river in open boats—a trip not always possible at this time of year. No ice has formed in the river yet, owing the open fall and winter.

SIR MAX AITKIN'S FATHER BURIED AT NEWCASTLE

Rev. Wm. Aitkin was Pastor of St. James' Church there for Over Twenty Years.

Newcastle, Dec. 22.—The funeral of late Rev. William Aitkin, 12th whose death occurred on Saturday, was held Monday afternoon, interment was in St. James' cemetery, of which church deceased had been pastor for 25 years, ending 1903. Services were conducted at the home by Rev. S. J. MacArthur, assisted by the Methodist pastor, Rev. D. Harrison. There was a very large attendance and a very long funeral procession. Costly and beautiful floral tributes were sent by all friends. All the children of deceased were home, but Sir Max, one daughter having to come from Los Angeles. The pallbearers were: D. Morrison, Ald. James Falconer, Osborne Nicholson, John Brand, G. S. Stohart and Thomas W. Fleet. The funeral was under the direction of Col. R. L. Malby, undertaker. Newcastle Division, No. 45 S. of T., had a most interesting debate on the question "Resolved that pride is worse than intemperance." Thursday night the leaders were Mrs. L. R. Hetherington and Mrs. H. S. Leard, with Rev. S. J. MacArthur judge. The debate was won by the affirmative.
