Boston, April 15.—Fear that the opening of the Panama Canal may be followed by a world-wide re-distribution of yellow fever and cholera, which will threaten very great commercial loss, was expressed today by Dr. Richard P. Strong, head of the Harvard Medical School of Tropical Medicine. Dr. Strong was formerly at the head of the government biological laboratory in the Philippines, and later became prominent through his work in combating the bubonic plague in Manchuria. Last year he headed the Harvard medical school expedition to Peru, where an extensive study of tropical diseases was made.

"One of the most interesting and not improbable changes in the distribution of tropical diseases is that the west coast of South América, particularly Gunyainuli, may send yellow fever to India and receive Asiatic cholera by way of exchange," he said.
