Cordial Welcome
Back To Canada

Members of Presbyterian Missionary Societies Met Mrs. T. Hunter Boyd.

A very cordial welcome back to Canada was extended to Mrs. T. Hunter Boyd yesterday afternoon by members of the Presbyterian Women's Missionary Societies of this city at a meeting in St. David's church. Mrs. Boyd was for several years president of the Presbyterian women's society and was stationed at Winkham, and her many friends were delighted to meet her once more, after an absence of seven years in Scotland.

Glasgow Port Chaplain

Rev. T. Hunter Boyd left Canada to become Port Chaplain at Glasgow, Scotland. He arrived in St. John today and while in Canada desires to get in touch with all organizations interested in immigration work. With Mrs. Boyd, he is a guest of Mr. and Mrs. James Stirling, 199 King street east.

Mrs. R. C. Crutcher, president of St. David's Women's Missionary Society, presided. Invitations were sent to all the Presbyterian Missionary Societies and a large number of members were present. Mrs. Boyd's address was the pleasure, which she felt at again having Mrs. Boyd in Canada.

Described Immigration Work

Mrs. Boyd described the immigration work at Glasgow telling of the activities taken up on the cessation of travel at the outbreak of war. Help was given many Canadians stranded in Glasgow. Then came a number of young Scottish boys between sixteen and nineteen, who were being sent to British High Schools and Colleges and Mrs. Boyd told of making things happen for these boys so far from home, who described in a very interesting way, the visiting of Canadian boys in hospital, and said that she met a number whose mothers she had known in Canada. This always created a bond of sympathy and she then wrote the mothers telling them of their boys' progress. A Canadian Place Day, at which \$2,000 was raised for Canadian hospitals, was another wonderful incident of the war work done.

Visited Ruthenia

Mr. and Mrs. Boyd visited Ruthenia in the interests of the Presbyterian missions who were in Czechoslovakia when it became a republic. Mrs. Boyd pointed out that war against Germany was not merely an effort to defeat the German army, but to free the smaller nations from oppression of the German Empire and Austria. Direct aid was sent among the lands about the Balkans, and they grasped the opportunity to shake off tyrants and oppressors and become free men.

At the close of the talk, which was greatly enjoyed, the ladies of St. David's invited all present to be the guests of afternoon tea and to meet Mrs. Boyd. A pleasant social hour was spent.

Chatham May
Apply For Dates

Miramichi Agricultural Exhibition Assn. Will Organize on Friday Afternoon.

Special to The Standard. Fredericton, Feb. 16.—Chatham may probably apply for dates in the Maine and New Brunswick racing circuit, which is now being formed, with the object of having the Chatham fair included in the circuit.

Maine and New Brunswick Circuit Opens in Fredericton Week of July 1.

Fredericton, Feb. 16.—The only troubles which appeared to be set the new Maine and New Brunswick racing circuit at the preliminary meeting held recently at Houlton, have been ironed out according to information received here from A. R. D. Woodstock and Caribou, who acted as chairman of the Houlton meeting. Woodstock and Caribou had both claimed the week of July 12th, and both expected to stage their race meetings in connection with celebrations by the Orangemen. The latest word is that Caribou have given up any claims they may have had to the dates to the New Brunswick town, and unless additions are made to the circuit by the inclusion of the New Brunswick towns applying for membership. His wife handed him a pistol and he rushed out after the men, his first shot killing Peach. As the latter tried to raise, Frey poured two more shots into his body and the second man fled.
