The provisions of that act are continued and expanded in a general tariff bill that is now before the Senate. The bill was passed by the House of Representatives some months ago, but has encountered much opposition in the committee of the Senate to which it was referred. Further delay is expected. Indeed, in some quarters, double are expressed with hostility to the bill can go through at all during the present season. It is hardly probable that any formal negotiation between the two Governments can take place until after the Fordney bill is disposed of.

Agricultural Bloc Powerful

An important feature of the tariff situation is the formation of what is called the 'agricultural bloc'—a combination of Senators of both political parties, representing chiefly Western States, where the farming interest is the dominant one. A member of this group said he was obliged to point out that as the Canadian farmer was a competitor with the farmer of the Western States, producing substantially the same things, he (the member) was afraid that any proposal for the free exchange of agricultural products would now meet with hostility from that group. However, I was reminded by several members that the Fordney Tariff Bill contains a clause authorizing the President to open negotiations for reciprocal trade with any country that is prepared to make satisfactory terms. While this clause is general in its terms, I am informed that those who are in the line of the bill had in mind the placing of some reciprocal arrangement with Canada.

CONSIDERED "CHIC" TO VIOLATE "PROHIB" LAW

Mrs. Asquith Thinks Prohibition, as She Found It, a Dismal Failure.

New York, March 6.—Canada is taking much better care of its sick and crippled soldiers than the United States authorities are. This was one of the many frank statements made by Mrs. Asquith last night on her return to New York from her tour of the principal Canadian and United States cities of the east. Mrs. Asquith asked the newspapermen to correct a story which had been published by a number of United States papers to the effect that she had been snubbed by the Governor-General in Ottawa. She said she had left her card at Rideau Hall, and had received in return a polite and charming note. The suggestion that she had been snubbed, she declared, was a "fantastic distortion of the truth."

FRASER MEMORIAL HOSPITAL OPENED

Capital City Now Boasts Institution of Which Whole Province Is Proud.
Fredericton, March 6.—The formal opening of the Donald Fraser Memorial Hospital took place tonight, and was attended by hundreds of the citizens who took the opportunity of inspecting the magnificent gift of the late Donald Fraser, for many years a citizen of Fredericton and a man who needs no introduction to the public. The Hospital will be operated as a part of the Victoria Hospital, the institution which serves practically all New Brunswick. It is a handsome structure of free stone, facing Woodstock Road and within view of Brunswick Street throughout its entire length. The building is three stories and a basement with equipment which is the last work in hospital fittings. Although formally handed over to-night the new building will not be in complete use for some time. Donald Fraser, of Plaster Rock, and Archibald Fraser, of Fredericton, sons of the donor of the building, were present and formally handed over the structure. The unveiling of a memorial tablet installed by the City of Fredericton was a portion of the ceremony. Upwards of two hundred thousand dollars was expended by the Messrs. Fraser in carrying out the wish expressed in the will of their father that Fredericton should have a modern hospital building. There were heavy expenditures in addition by which a central heating plant was provided for all the parts of the hospital. Forty thousand dollars of that was provided by the City Corporation of Fredericton. W. W. Boyce, a member of the Hospital Board, was a generous contributor to the expense of connecting the new building with the original hospital, and the estate of Edward Moore, of Fredericton, also aided substantially. T. G. Loggie is the present President of the Hospital Board.
