

Departmental work was then taken, the following reports being read :

Mrs. Warren, fraternal delegate from Wheeling, Virginia, was introduced and received by Convention. Mrs. Warren spoke a few kindly words of greeting, in which she took occasion to refer to her unalterable hatred to the liquor traffic.

The hour now having arrived for the Memorial Service for our greatly beloved promoted Treasurer, Miss Jennie MacArthur, Mrs. Bigelow, of Cornwall was asked to be in charge of the same.

The hymn "Forever With the Lord" was sung. Mrs. Bigelow read a portion of Revelations VII, and followed by a touching, tender tribute to the worth and excellence of her "who being dead yet speaketh."

Mrs. Bigelow also spoke of the Memorial Fountain erected in Cornwall to the memory of Miss MacArthur, by the local societies of the W. C. T. U. and King's Daughters, and which was formally presented to the town on August 15th, 1900.

Mrs. Gordon, of Ottawa, followed with a solo, "In the Homeland," accompanied by her autoharp. Likewise paying a tribute to Miss MacArthur.

Mrs. Gordon was succeeded by Miss Wiggins, Mesdames Smith, Warren, Chamberlin, McKee, Livingstone and a Cornwall "Y," Miss Ethel Alguire. Through the service it almost seemed as if the gates had swung wide, the spirit of our dear comrade hovering near, and more than one present, through it, caught a "foretaste of the heavenly."

The pronouncing of the benediction closed the morning session.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
