It was a busy night on both sides of the St. Clair, for while Mrs. White was holding up the women on this side, the American officials were searching many Sarnia residents for wet goods on the American side.
Sarnia merchants deny that they are responsible for Mrs. White's visit to this city, and today it was announced that she had left for another border city.

ALDERMEN WANT EXPLANATION OF "JOKE" CLAUSE
Questions Will Be Asked At Council Meeting Tonight.

BRANTFORD, March 6.—Mayor Wedlake denies an explanation of the joke clause in Brantford's private bill before the Legislature, which provides for a local board of control of nine members, each of whom would receive \$1,500 a year. Local aldermen will call for an explanation at the council session Monday night. The mayor stated that the clause which would hold up the bill until full information was given out.
Was Not Included.
Mr. M. MacBride, M.L.A., who first moved Brantford's private bill in the Legislature, stated this afternoon that the money clause had not been included in the copy of the bill which he had received. He had received no communication from Mayor Wedlake or the city council since the bill was introduced, and he intended holding up the bill until full information was given out.

SUB-CHASER FIRES UPON CABLE LAYER
U. S. War Vessel Prevents Landing of Western Union Cable.

MIAMI, Fla., March 6.—Work of connecting the Western Union Miami-Bahamas cable began again yesterday afternoon, when the U. S. sub-chaser cutter, the U. S. S. Albatross, appeared and opened fire on the cable ship Robert C. Clowry and placed the entire crew under arrest. This clash between the United States navy and the Western Union Telegraph Company was the second that has occurred in the efforts of the Government to prevent the cable company from laying cable in Miami. An attempt to run the cable across the channel on the western side of the causeway last summer was prevented by armed forces of the navy, and a sub-chaser has been stationed here ever since to prevent a repetition of the cable-laying operations.
Last week in the New York federal court the injunction against the Western Union Telegraph company, preventing the landing of the cable, was set aside, and the telegraph company was successful in securing a court order restraining the Government from interfering with the work.

DIED VERY SUDDENLY.
WINDSOR, March 5.—Funeral services for Mrs. E. J. Bright, 74 years old, will be held Monday at the residence of her son, P. E. Bright, 404 Pelissier street. Mrs. Bright died suddenly today of heart disease.

DRY'S READY FOR REFERENDUM
Ex-Mayor Chant Will Lead Fight Against Liquor.

ST. THOMAS, March 6.—The temperance workers of the city organized last evening to further the passage of the referendum, and plans for immediate active work will be formulated by the executive at a meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Monday evening. Ex-Mayor S. Chant was chosen president, vice-president, James Tremblay, secretary; J. L. Coulter, Henry Wing, secretary; chairman of the finance board, W. G. Rogers. BANDITS' BULLET KILLS DRUGGIST
L. C. Sabine Victim—Former Hotelman Brutally Beaten, Robbed.

TORONTO, March 6.—Leonard Cecil Sabine, druggist, was shot and fatally injured at 10:50 Saturday night by two bandits as he was making up his cash behind his counter, preparatory to closing the store for the night. He died in the Western Hospital this afternoon after an operation had been performed in an effort to extract the bullet, which had lodged in his abdomen.
William Joyce, Mr. Sabine's assistant, was in a room at the rear of the drug store when the bandits entered. On hearing the shot he ran into the store. The bandits grabbed what loose change there was on the counter and fled from the store. One of the pair wore a handkerchief in such a manner as to practically hide his face.
Mr. Sabine, in the hospital Saturday night, outlined the story of the assault. He said that the two gunmen presented two revolvers at his body without parley just after they had entered the store and ordered him to empty the cash register for them. He refused. Then one of the pair with a curse, pulled the trigger of his revolver and sent a bullet into Sabine's body. He dropped to the floor and the bandits grabbed what they could from the cash register and departed. He described his assailants as being about 20 and 25 years of age.
No trace of the murderers has been found at a late hour tonight. It is believed by the police that they are the pair who have been committing numerous hold-ups in the last week or two of this city.

BEATEN AND ROBBED.
TORONTO, March 6.—William A. Ball, a former well-known hotelkeeper in the west end of this city, who now conducts a public garage, was brutally beaten by two thugs in his private garage in the rear of his home Saturday night, and robbed of \$150 in cash, a diamond tie-pin valued at \$150, and checks to the amount of \$55.
Mr. Ball is of the opinion that the pair knew him and were lying in wait for him in the darkened building. They called him by name and demanded that he hand over his money and valuables, which he refused to do. He was then beaten and his head was hit with a monkey-wrench.
In order to make a quick job of the robbery, the bandits cut out the knots in Mr. Ball's clothes, and cut his collar and tie away to get the tiepin. Mr. Ball shouted "Help! Help! They're killing me!" His wife heard his voice and ran out of the house crying "Murder!" It was about 10 o'clock at night and the neighbors hearing the outcry hurried to the scene. The robbers had an automobile standing nearby, and they quickly got away.

CAPT. WALTER LINTON DIES VERY SUDDENLY
Stricken With Heart-Failure While Attending Church Service.

SARNIA, March 6.—While attending church here today with his wife, Capt. Walter E. Linton of Mooretown dropped dead from heart-failure. He was one of the best known sailors in this district and had been sailing out of Great Lakes ports for 26 years. For some years prior to taking up his residence at Mooretown he resided at Hagersville and Toronto. Of late he had been in charge of steamers of the Great Lakes Transportation Company. Surviving are his wife and sister, Miss Agnes Linton of Toronto.

POLICE START SEARCH FOR CENTENARIAN
NEW YORK, March 5.—A city-wide police search was instituted today for Abraham Brown, 104 years old, missing since yesterday morning.

His seventy-five-year-old daughter, with whom he lived, said he was accustomed to taking long morning walks, was very active and she feared he had met with foul play.
