Mayor Returned to Office for a Third Term With 971 Majority, the Biggest Ever Given to Any Mayoralty Candidate. Eleven Members of 1918 Council Re-elected. Ald. N. Asmussen Led the Poll.

Cemetery By-law Carried The by-law to expend \$10,000 on cemetery grounds was carried by 1009 to 549, a majority of 460. A Light Vote The vote polled yesterday was the lightest in many years, only 2371 votes being recorded for the mayorality. In the morning the voting was fair proportion but with the unfavorable turn in the weather in the afternoon many voters, who otherwise would have voted, stayed at home. In some sub-divisional divisions not half the total number of voters was polled. A General Review The result of the Mayorality contest, if it may be called such, was never in doubt. It was only a question of the extent of the majority for Mayor Gross. The first report from the Board of the Record was from No. 14, 29 Pandora Ave., which was received at 5:30 o'clock. It gave Mayor Gross a majority of nine, the standing being 42 against 33 for Allen Eby. No. 19, 141 West King Street, followed ten minutes later; here the vote was 27 to 20 for Mr. Gross.
