EDWARDS REFUSES TO EXPLAIN

KINGSTON, Nov. 18.—Dr. J. W.
Edwards M.P. in a letter to local
branch of G.W.V.A. states he has no
explanation to make re his statement
in connection with soldiers' re-estab-
lishment. He was reported as saying
he was opposed giving returned men
one dollar more even though the coun-
try had money to give. The member
for Frontenac states that the veterans
have no right to ask for an explanation
and that none will be given.

EUROPEAN EXPORTS STOPPED

Washington, Nov. 18.—Arguments
on the validity of the War-Time Pro-
hibition Act will be heard by the Su-
preme Court, but a decision is not ex-
pected before December 8.

Should the supreme court hold the
war-time act unconstitutional, millions
of gallons of whiskey and wine would
be placed on the market immediately
in those states which had not voted
out liquor before the operation of the
federal act.

Moreover, many opponents of prohi-
bition expect peace to be an accom-
plished fact before the end of the pre-
sent special session of Congress.

The White House has announced
that immediately upon the proclama-
tion of peace President Wilson will de-
clare the war-time prohibition at an
end.

Indian Soldier Dies far from Northern Home

One of the Indians of the Hudson
Bay country, who left his native life
in the north to fight for his white
British brothers, died in Speedwell
Hospital at Guelph. He was a full-
blooded Cree Indian, but had taken the
name Thomas Sutherland and had been
a Scottish family at a Hudson Bay post
at Moose Factory, where he was born
in 1882. In the winter of 1910, with
other Cree Indians, he tramped on
snowshoes to Cochrane to enlist in an
Indian platoon in a new Ontario bat-
talion.

He served with the First Pioneer
Battalion in France, and was so
bly gassed that he was returned
to Canada. He was first taken to
Gravenhurst and later transferred to
Guelph.

Londoners To Vote

On Two Proposals.
London City Council decided to
send to a vote of the people at the Jan-
uary elections the proposal of the West-
ern Fair Board to purchase \$300,000
worth of property adjoining Queen's
Park for the purpose of facilitating
the expansion of the Exhibition.

The request of the London & Port
Stanley Railway for a vote on the is-
sue of \$218,000 worth of debentures to
cover a program of road and structure
improvements, and the cost of a new
electric locomotive and other rolling stock,
was sent back to the Finance Com-
mittee.

The Council sent to the ratepayers
also the proposal to build a 100,000
memorial hall for soldiers, to be used
for the social and business purposes of
veterans' organizations.

Mayor Somerville announced that
he will retire at the conclusion of this
term.

South Waterloo subscribed a grand
total of \$3,196,600 for the Victory Loan,
while the objective was \$2,250,000.
