MAYOR McCALLION:

Tells it like it is

STREETSVILLE - A woman from Mississauga won an easy victory last Saturday over an experienced businessman, a former mayor and a 21-year town resident for the top municipal job here.

How did Mrs. Hazel McCallion, a relative newcomer to municipal politics and resident of another town (by 1,500 feet) defeat such a formidable candidate and become the first woman mayor of Streetsville?

In an exclusive interview with The News she explained:

DEFINITE

"I took a definite stand on Streetsville's future and on our boundary study. I said, and I maintain, that we must expand or disappear."

"My opponent (Bill Tolton 55, retired publisher) straddled the line on this issue. He said nothing. He just said that regional government is here. Well, we know that."

"I am not opposed to regional government 'per se', and I realize it is coming.

But its areas of jurisdiction must be clearly defined."

"Most important, Streetsville must remain as a separate, urban entity within whatever form regional government takes."

Mrs. McCallion felt the outcome of the election directly reflected the feeling of the voters on this issue.

Some 58.5 percent of those who voted agreed with her stand.

During a two-year term on council, part of which was spent as reeve, "I tried in all cases to take care of ratepayers who came to me with problems", she said.

CALL HAZEL

"The word got around 'if you want action, call Hazel'. I wasn't always able to go back with a pleasant answer and it wasn't always possible to solve the problems. But, at least I got back."

Her first step as mayor will be to undertake further negotiations with the provincial government on the town's \$18,000 boundary study.

The study, completed

more than a year ago, staked out the town's claim to future independence. It recommended that the town expand to include a substantial chunk of adjoining Mississauga and become a "corridor city" with a population between 100,000 and 200,000.

"It is important that we get concrete comments from Mississauga on the study. We have given it to them but so far, we haven't heard anything."

HAPPY

Mrs. McCallion said she was "very happy" with her victory and considered her job a "real challenge".

She said she was pleased with the new council she will be working with for the next two years.

"I am especially pleased with Nan's (Mrs. Anne Wright) election. She is a personal friend and I am glad to have another female voice on council."

Mrs. McCallion will be officially sworn in at the inaugural meeting of council tentatively scheduled for Jan. 5 or Jan. 12, 1970.
