



Ottawa, March 31, 1913.

Sir,

In reply to your letter of the 14th instant inquiring if the Indians have any right to camp on any other ground than their reserves, stating that a bunch of them are camped on Township 38, Range 17, W. of 2nd M., and asking what can be done with them, I beg to say that they have no right to camp on any land taken up by a settler, and if they have done so they should be warned off as trespassers by the owner of the land. They, however, can temporarily camp on unoccupied lands, as by treaty they have the right to hunt game in season according to the provisions of the Game Act.
