- Q. By the Japanese who do you mean?
- A. The Camp Commander, sir.
- Q. Who obtained that permission for that change?
- A. I believe Sgt. Harvey and M.Q.M.S. Rogers, sir.
- Q. You were not present at the
- A. No, sir, I wasn't.
- . And the information you have you secured from them?
- A. Yes. sir.
- Now, two days after Dr. Stenning left Wajor Beadnell arrived?
- A. I don't know if it was two days, sir. I know it was very shortly after Dr. Stenning left that Major Beadnell did arrive.
- Q. And when Major Beadnell arrived did he replace Dr. Stenning on the committee?
- A. Yes, sir, I believe so. I am not quite sure.
- Q. Well now, you would know?
- A. Well, to be quite honest with you, sir, I don't.
- Q. Any possible explanation why you don't know?
- A. Yes, sir, You see, to get Surgeon Lieutenant Stenning on the committee Sgt. Harvoy had to go to the Camp Commander regarding this matter; and whether that incident happened with Major Beadnell or not I am not quite sure. I know that he has signed orders under which was typed. "Major Beadnell, O.C. Prisoners of War in Oeyama", but whether any incidents led up to that whereby he was appointed a member of the committee I am not quite sure.

- A. That is not true, sir.
