Mrs. Mary Sheldon, mother of W. D. Sheldon, of this city, passed away last night at her home in Blenheim. Mrs. Sheldon was in her 88th year. She was born in New York state, but came to Blenheim with her husband and family about fifty years ago. W. D. Sheldon, of this city, and Charles and Lewis Sheldon, of Blenheim, are sons. The late Oscar Sheldon, of Blenheim, and the late O. B. Sheldon, of Chatham, were also sons.

CONVENE HERE

On Wednesday, Nov. 18th, a meeting of the Sabbath School Association of Ontario will be held in the First Presbyterian church of this city. INQUEST TO BE HELD

Coroner Dr. R. C. Young, of Ridgetown, called the Crown Attorney up by phone this morning and the latter advised an inquest in connection with the explosion in Ridgetown last evening. A jury was empanelled and the inquest was adjourned. Dr. Young stated that the windows in the Union block and Porter block were all shattered and the Lozar House was ruined beyond any repair.

Thomas Watson, one of the injured in an ex-mayor of Ridgetown and was once the Conservative candidate in East Kent. He was only married about two weeks ago. This is the second explosion Mr. Watson has been in. His wife, at the time Watson's mill was blown up, but his brother William was killed.
Col. Barclay is another of the injured. His brother David was killed on the Lake Erie track a few years ago.

RIOTERS FINED.

Punishment For the Strikers at Niagara Falls.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Nov. 12.—The fourteen Italian rioters who were arrested at the power works strike here were up for trial before Police Magistrate Cruickshank. Crown Attorney T. D. Cowper of Welland conducted the prosecution, while Messrs. W. M. German, Alex. Fraser, F. W. Griffiths and Stanley Fraser defended the rioters. The Magistrate and lawyers had a hard job to make the foreigners understand the nature of the charge, which was read to them, and the aid of an interpreter had to be called in. After several witnesses were heard three of the rioters, named Donatti Defiora, Michael Magnia and Soferio Vincoza, were fined \$15 and costs or two months in jail each. Michael Bullor, the Hungarian, was fined \$10 and costs or two months. Rosario Spornano was fined \$25 for carrying a dagger and \$15 and costs for rioting. Pietro Ricorro was dismissed from custody, he being proven innocent of any wrongdoing. The others were fined \$10 and costs or two months. Vincenzo Cirrictora, charged with stabbing young Hamilton in the face, elected to be tried by a jury, and was committed for trial, December 2nd, at Welland.

DEATH OF MRS. C. D. MASSEY.

Passed Away After an Operation in London, England.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—A cablegram was received by Mrs. Lillian Massey-Treble, Jarvis street, yesterday, conveying the sad news of the sudden death of Mrs. Chester D. Massey in London, England. It stated that the end came at 2 o'clock yesterday morning. Last June Mrs. Massey, accompanied by Mr. Massey and her family, left Toronto on a visit to England.

WILL NOT GO TO ST. LOUIS.

Canadian Breeders Tired of American Pin-pricks.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—There will probably be no exhibit of Canadian live stock at the St. Louis Exhibition. The Dominion Government granted \$100,000 to assist Canadians to make a creditable show provided the conditions were acceptable. A thorough representative meeting of breeders at the Rossin last night decided that the conditions were not acceptable, and being convinced that no change would be made practically decided to make no exhibit.

BORROWED FOR CHARITY.

Curious End of a Whitby Lady's Benevolence.

Whitby, Nov. 12.—Whitby has been startled by the revelations following a meeting of the creditors of Mrs. Matthew Gold, long regarded as the richest and known to be one of the most philanthropic women in the district. For nearly twenty years Mrs. Gold, to gratify her apparent mania for spending money for charitable purposes, has carried on a system of borrowing money unknown even to her husband. She has dissipated not only her own private fortune, but involved herself in heavy debt.
