

In the section for bulls three years and upwards Steacy's Carlyle of Lessnessock is placed at the head of the list, with Drummond's Glencairn 2nd, and the same exhibitors. Kelso Boy, which was first at Toron-o, is here placed 3rd. This is the third time the order of rating these three bulls has been changed since they started on the circuit of the fairs. At Montreal Glencairn was 1st, Kel-o Boy 2nd, and Carlyle 3rd. At Toronto it was Kelso Boy 1st, Carlyle 2nd, and Glencairn 4th. Now it is Carlyle 1, Glencairn 2, and Kelso Boy 3. The young judge will learn slowly with such examples before him. Steacy's winnings here, in addition to the above, were 1st for two-year-old bull, 1st and 3rd for cow, 3rd for three-year-old cow, 2nd for yearling heifer, sweepstakes for bull (Carlyle of Lessnessock) and for cow (White Rose of Alticane), and 1st for herd. Drummond won 2nd and 3rd for aged bulls, 2nd for bull calf, 2nd for cow, 1st and 2nd for three-year-old cow, 1st for two-year-old heifer, 1st and 3rd for yearling heifer, 1st and 2nd for heifer calf, and 1st for best four calves. W. T. Thompson, Rockton, scored 1st with his yearling bull, and W. son, Plattsville, 2nd. Mr. Nichol also won 2nd prize for two-year-old heifer and 3rd for heifer calf. George Hill, Delaware, showed a very fine bull calf and won 2nd prize.

**Grade Cattle.**—There was a splendid show of grade Durhams made by Goodfellow Bros., Macville; Jas Leask, Greenbank; and James Oke, Alvinston. Goodfellow won 1st for cow over three years o'd. Oke scored 1st for two-year-old heifer and heifer calf. Leask got 1st prize for yearling heifer and diploma for best female any age. There was a splendid showing of fat cattle, and Mr. Oke won 1st with two-year-old steer, 1st for cow or heifer under four years, 1st for steer calf and heifer calf. James Rennie, Wick, had the 1st prize yearling steer, a wonderful one for his age.

**Dorset Horns.**—The exhibitors in this class were R. H. Harding (Thorndale), James Bowman (Guelph), and Shaw-Wood (London). Mr. Harding won 1st prizes for aged ram, shearing ram, ram lamb, ewes, shearing ewes, and ewe lambs, and the flock prize. Mr. Bowman got 2nd prize for aged ram and for ewe lambs.

*Berkshires* were judged by Mr. Thos. Teasdale, Concord. The principal exhibitors were Geo. Green, Fairview; T. A. Cox, Brantford; W. McAllister, Varma; and James McKewn, Kertch; who showed a very fine pen of pigs under six months, the sire and dam of which were bred by J. C. Snell, Snelgrove; also a lengthy and useful young boar purchased from the Snelgrove herd this year. He secured 3rd prize for boar under six months, and Mr. Green won 1st, 2nd and 3rd for sows under six months, as well as 1st and 2nd for boar of that age, and several other 1st prizes, besides the herd prize for boar and three sows. McAllister had 1st prize boar over a year and 1st prize sow with four of her offspring. Cox had the 1st and 3rd prize boar under a year.

*Tameworths* were strongly in evidence, being shown by H. George & Son, Crampton; W. T. Elliot, Hamilton; W. W. Fisher, Benmiller; J. Hord & Son, Parkhill; T. F. Holland and E. C. Corbett, Dereham Centre; W. H. Odell,

Kelso Boy, sired by the noted imported Silver King 5809 and out of imp. Maggie Mitchell 5387, was bred by D. McLachlan, but is now one of the heads of Mr. Daniel Drummond's noted herd at Petite Côte, Q. C. He was calved in August, 1892, and therefore competed in the fall bull section at the four large shows. Commencing with Montreal show he won 2nd, at Toronto 1st and sweepstakes, at London 3rd, and Ottawa again 1st, being beaten on two occasions by his stable mate, Glencairn of Maple Grove.

The classes of sheep were all well filled, most of the Toronto exhibits being on hand and a good many new entries besides. An overflow meeting had to be provided for, and the farmers' assembly room was improvised for the accommodation of the extra entries of sheep which could not find room in the mammoth building for stock. The main building for cattle and sheep requires improvement in the way of ventilation, as the health of the stock, especially the sheep, suffered severely during the hot days of the fair. If the show continues to grow as it has the whole of this building will soon be needed for cattle, and new and improved buildings should be provided for the exhibits of sheep. When this is done let there be light and a free circulation of air.

Cotswolds were shown by A. J. Watson, Castlederg, who had forward his new importation of a dozen head, among which were several prize winners at the Royal Show of England. Other exhibitors and prize winners here were: John Park & Sons, Burgessville; Heber Rawlings & Sons, Ravenswood; T. H. Shore, Glanworth; and others. Mr. James Russell, Richmond Hill, was the judge. Watson won 1st prize for shearing ram, 1st and 2nd for ram lambs, 1st for shearing ewes, and 1st and 3rd for ewe lambs. Park & Sons got away with 1st and 2nd on two-year-old ram, the diploma for best ram any age, 1st on aged ewes, 2nd for shearing ewes and ewe lambs, 1st for best ewe any age, for pen of five yearlings, for pen of five lambs, and the three flock prizes. Mr. Shore got 3rd on aged ram, 2nd on shearing ram, and on pen of four lambs.
