DARING FEATS OF BREAKING FROM PRISON

French Soldier at Marseilles Emulates Jean Valjean.

FELON WHO SIMPLY VANISHED Tunnel From American Prison Found Just in Time.

Some time ago the police arrested in Paris a man named George Boucher, who had escaped four times from custody in a daring manner and won for himself the title of "Monte Cristo." When, in 1899, he was called up for military service in Algiers he behaved so mutiniously that he was imprisoned in the barrack cells. He managed to escape, but was soon after caught in Paris. While on the way back to Algiers Boucher was confined for a short time in the prison of St. Jean at Marseilles, a medieval convict settlement on the ramparts, which are a hundred feet above the sea, he dived into the water, missing the rocks by a few inches. Then he swam under the water to avoid the bullets of the warders, and finally succeeded in escaping.

The Paris police authorities do not know to this day how Dhula, alias "The Boar," chief of a gang of Apaches, escaped from Pomme Prison, near Paris. He simply vanished from his cell without leaving behind him the slightest clue as to his methods of departure. A warder was suspected of having opened the doors of the prison and allowed him to escape, but this official proved that he was not in the vicinity of the cell at the time of the escape. It has been thought that Dhula was an expert burglar and could open any lock without damaging its mechanism. He certainly must have passed through at least half a dozen doors to make his way from the prison, and those doors were found securely locked after he had vanished.

LOSSES LIGHT IN FIGHTING
Berlin Admits That Russians are making Serious efforts to Break Through in East.
French Colonel Tells How Douaumont Was Taken.

By Special Wire to the Courier.
Paris, March 24.—There has been no change in the situation at Verdun since yesterday, according to an official announcement from the German High Command.

LOSSES LIGHT.
Paris, March 24.—(Montreuil report)—The smallest losses are emphasized in an interview with a German officer. "The Russian losses are light," he says. "The Colonel is quoted as saying: 'The regiment holding Douaumont has been holding the fort since the night of the 21st. The only thirty-five men left before them was a slaughter. Mangled bodies were heaped up, but the attitude of the men was heroic.'"

BAYONET FIGHT.
His account of the recent Douaumont shows that the fight was fought with the bayonet on a "P" said to the general command.
"Don't worry about artillery ports, just smash the enemy at right and left; then we'll get them out with steel." They charged up two climbing like cats. A few later Douaumont was retaken out a shot being fired.

BIG EASTERN STRUGGLE.
Berlin, via London, March 24.—Importance of the struggle at Verdun naturally overestimated in the contest on the east but the latest despatches of hard fighting in progress northern sector of the Russian front.
